That German Cable Wouldn't Help Much

GERMAN FLAG IS CAPTURED WITH AID OF BAYONET

PARIS, Aug. 20, 8 a. m.—An officer of a French rifle regiment gives to the Petit Troyen the following account of the capture of the first German flag:

"The engagement of the French troops with the 99th Brigade of Germans lasted from 5:30 a. m. to 9 at night.

"The artillery combat was terrible. The French 75 millimeter guns made havoc among the German horses and then reduced the heavy German guns to silence. The gunners were decimated by the French fire and they abandoned their pieces, which fell into French hands.

"The German machine guns from a church steeple continued to ravage the French, but the church was finally demolished.

"At nightfall the French charged the enemy's defense works with irresistible energy and took them at the point of the bayonet. They established themselves there for the night.

"In this action the Fifth company of the First Battalion captured a German flag with eight guns, 90 horses and 537 prisoners, including ten officers."

PRELATE RECEIVES CONFIRMATION OF PONTIFF'S DEATH

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The official announcement of the vatican of the death of Pope Pius X was received by the apostolic delegate, Monsignor Bonzano, at 7:30 this morning, at the moment he was celebrating mass in the chapel of the delegation. It came from Cardinal Merry Del Val, papal secretary of state, was dated at Rome at 4:44 this morning, and said:

"Holy Father, Pius X, died this night."

With the death of Pope Pius and until the meeting of the conclave in Rome about ten days hence the functions of pope are temporarily exercised by the cardinal of the Roman Catholic church, Cardinal Della Volpe. With him at Rome are twenty-four other members of the cardinalate, including among the notable figures Cardinal Serafino Vannetti and his brother, Vincenz Vannetti, Cardinal Gotti, prefect of the propaganda; Cardinal De Lai, secretary of the congregation of the consistory. These will be joined at once by the cardinals from other parts of the world. Cardinal Farley, it is understood, is always in Switzerland, while the movements of the other American cardinals, Gibbons and O'Connell, are expected to be dependent somewhat on the interrupted ocean transit.

AMERICANS IN GERMANY GIVEN GOOD TREATMENT

ROTTERDAM, via London, Aug. 20, 1:45 p. m.—Further arrivals of Germans are expected here today. They will be welcomed by Soren Lister, the American consul-general, who will extend all facilities at his command.

Concerning the reported abuse of Americans in Germany, Consul Lister today made the following statement: "Americans now arriving here speak highly of the treatment accorded them by the Germans. Those who had trouble were mistaken for Englishmen. There has been no willful abuse and any instances of hardship were due to the state of war and the precautions thought necessary. The German government ten days ago notified Burgomasters that they would be held personally responsible for any injury done to Americans and other foreigners."

Frederick Wright, a physician of Douglas, Ariz., who has just come from Germany, said:

"Americans in Germany have no cause for complaint. Their treatment could not be better. The Hotel Bristol in Berlin placed 150 rooms at the free disposal of Americans who were financially embarrassed owing to the difficulties in cashing checks.

BLIND BISHOP SHOT AS SPY BY GERMANS

PARIS, Aug. 20.—La Croix, the Catholic newspaper, declares that the blind bishop Monsignor Kannengieser, alleged to have been shot by the Germans at Istein, in Baden, was an Alsatian and anti-German.

He was accused by the Germans of having in his possession plans of the fortress of Istein-Glotz, where a large German force is awaiting the advance of the French army now marching through upper Alsace.

Istein-Glotz is regarded as almost impregnable and is the center of the ring of German fortifications in that region.
