AMERICANS IN **GERMANY GIVEN**

ROTTERDAM, via London, Aug. 20, 1:45 p. m .- Further arrivals of Germany are expected here today. They will be welcomed by Soren Listoe, the American consul-general, who will extend all facilities at his command.

Concerning the reported abuse of Americans in Germany, Consul Listo today made the following statement: "Americans now arriving here

speak highly of the treatment accorded them by the Germans. Those who had trouble were mistaken for Englishmen. There has been no wilful abuse and any instances of hardship were due to the state of war and the precautions thought necessary. The German government ten days ago notified Burgomasters that they would be held personally responsible for any injury done to Americans and other foreigners."

Frederick Wright, a physician or Douglas, Ariz., who has just come from Germany, said:

"Americans in Germany have no cause for complaint. Their treatment could not be better. The Hotel Bristol in Berlin placed 150 rooms at the free disposal of Americans who clear all the militiamen of the charges were financially embarrased owing to the difficulties in cashing checks.

ENDS LABORS IN

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 20.-Adjutant General oJhn Chase said today that he had turned over to Governor Ammons the findings of the cour martial which recently tried twentytwo officers and men of the Colorado National Guard on charges growing out of the battle of Ludlow between militiamen and striking coal miners on April 20. The governor and the adjutant general, according to the latter, spent a great part of last night reviewing the verdiets. Early today Governor Ammons left the city to spend the rest of the week on his ranch in western Colorado, and the official announcement of the court martial findings probably will not be made until after his return.
