"Many women eat too much. When I am performing, when, therefore, I wish to be at my physical best, I eat very little. A woman should eat what she likes, if it is simple, nutritious and well cooked, but she should never over-eat."

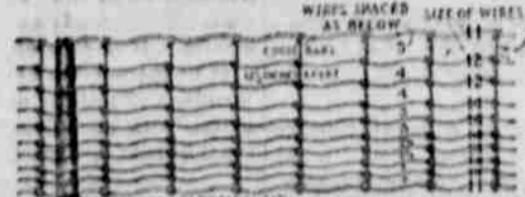
