

## KAISER'S NEPHEW TAKEN PRISONER BY FRENCH TROOPS

PARIS, Aug. 25, 7 a. m.—A dispatch to the Eclair from Courtrai says that the emperor's nephew, Count Von Schwerin, has been taken prisoner. He was in command of a detachment of Uhlans, who reached Harlebeke. French chasseurs being informed of the presence of the Germans, arrived, killing one, wounded several and made prisoners of the others.

According to the Matin, the ministry of commerce is considering the best means of annulling German patents and trade marks in France, following the similar practice adopted in England.

A dispatch from Geneva says that a business man who has just returned from Strassburg gives his impressions, which are printed in the Tribune. He says that the garrison of Strassburg was practically annihilated in the battle of Schirmeck. Of 5500 men who went into the fight, only 1800 returned. Four German batteries were put out of action before they were able to fire a shot.

## BLAMES TISZA FOR EUROPEAN WAR

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—That it was Count Tisza and not the aged Emperor Franz Joseph who is held responsible by the Austrians for the European war is the declaration made last night by Rabbi Mayer Kopstein to his congregation here while telling of his experiences as an American refugee in Vienna when Austria declared war on Serbia. Rabbi Kopstein returned on the Noordam yesterday.

"I went to bed comfortably one night in Vienna," he said, "with plenty of resources at my command. On every lip that night was the name of Count Tisza. The people knew informally that it was he who had written the ultimatum to Serbia, and it was in the air that Germany could be counted on to leap to Austria's aid and that Russia would back up Serbia."

## JAPANESE WARSHIP GOING TO ESQUIMALT

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 25.—The marine correspondent at Tatoosh, Wash., of the San Francisco chamber of commerce telegraphs that the Japanese cruiser Idzumo, which left here last Saturday, passed into the Straits of Juan de Fuca early today, apparently bound for the Canadian naval base at Esquimalt.

The appearance of the Idzumo in northern waters was a distinct surprise, and not even speculative explanations were forthcoming.

It had been supposed that the Idzumo would convoy the Shinyo Maru, which sailed yesterday for Japan and a report that the two vessels joined company last night is now shown to be an error.

Apparently the Idzumo will now use Esquimalt for a base, and will continue to operate on the Canadian and American Pacific coasts, as a protection for British, Japanese and French shipping.

## FRENCH WATERWAYS TO BE RE-OPENED

PARIS, Aug. 25, 12:08 p. m.—With the idea of facilitating commerce in France, it was officially announced today that the waterways in the interior of the republic are to be reopened. It is understood, however, that military movements will be given preference over all other traffic.

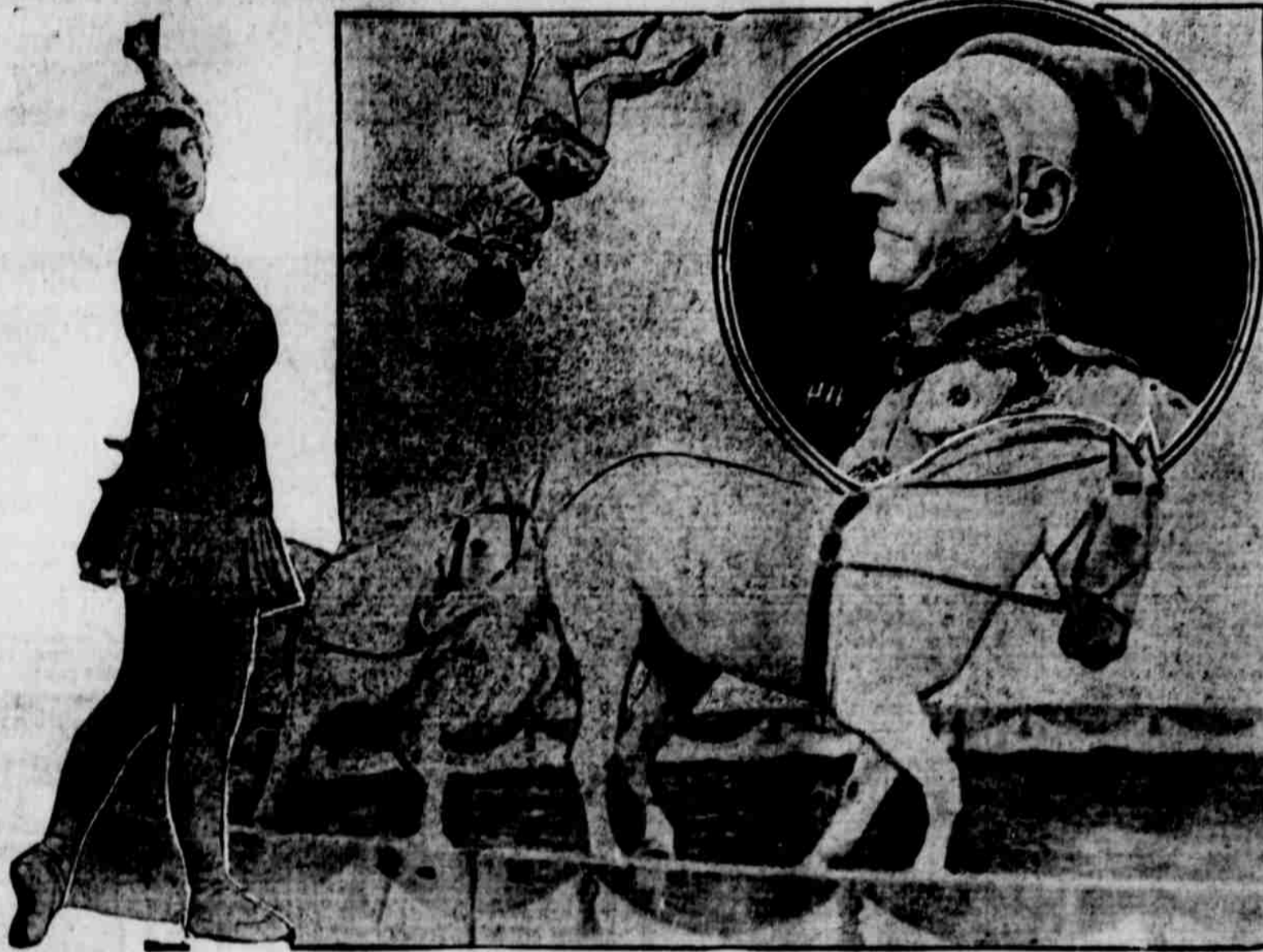
## FRANCE ORDERS 15,000 HORSES FROM AMERICA

### CARDINALS GIVEN ROOMS IN VATICAN

ROME, Aug. 25.—Owing to their feebleness, several of the cardinals who will attend the conclave to select a successor to Pope Pius X will be given rooms in the vatican near the Sistine Chapel, where the ballot will be held twice daily. Other cardinals have been notified that they may attend mass in their rooms, thus avoiding fatigue of going every morning to the Pauline Chapel.

### BELGIAN REFUGEES REACH MAESTRICHT

MAESTRICHT, Aug. 25, via London, 2:12 p. m.—Fugitives from Belgium continue to arrive here. Many of them are slightly wounded. The total number of these fugitives is now nearly 7000, and they are being cared for in sheds. Those who have made their way here during the last few days are, mostly from the vicinity of Malines.

There has arrived also a large number of Belgian farmers who consider it is no longer safe to stay on their lands. They say that the treatment of Belgians by the Germans has been none too good, but the opinion prevails here that this treatment is due to overt acts on the part of peasants. Many of the refugees at Maestricht today fought in 1870 and 1871.

### BRITISH HOLD UP TRAMP AUSTRIAN STEAMER

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—A tramp steamer, believed to be an Austrian, was held up shortly after 11 o'clock today by a cruiser supposed to be British just outside New York harbor, according to observers at Fire Island.
