KAISER'S NEPHEW TAKEN PRISONER BY FRENCH TROOPS

PARIS, Aug. 25, 7 a. m. - A dispatch to the Eclair from Courtres says that the emperor's nephew, Count Von Schwerin, has been taken prisoner. He was in command of a detachment of Uhlans, who reached Harlebeke. French chasseurs being informed of the presence of the Bermans, arrived, killing one, wounded several and made prisoners of the others.
