

11 LIVES LOST IN SHIP COLLISION PUGET SOUND

Steel Passenger Ship Admiral Sampson of Pacific Alaska Navigation Company Rammied and Sunk by Canadian Pacific Liner Princess Victoria Twenty Miles From Seattle

SEATTLE, Aug. 26.—Eleven lives were lost when the steel passenger ship Admiral Sampson of the Pacific Alaska Navigation company was rammied and sunk by the Canadian Pacific passenger steamship Princess Victoria off Point No Point, twenty miles north of Seattle, at 6:30 o'clock this morning during a fog and thick smoke from forest fires. The Princess Victoria brought the survivors to Seattle. Eight of the lost were members of the crew and two passengers. The dead among the crew are:

The name of the other lost passenger is not yet obtainable. Captain Moore could have saved himself, but he declared that he would go down with the ship, and did so. The Princess Victoria was not seriously damaged, though her bow and forepeak were crushed. She was able to back away from the Sampson. Captain Z. S. Moore and the chief engineer of the Sampson are missing. The loss in ship and cargo is probably \$200,000.

The Princess Victoria, reporting the accident, said she was proceeding to Seattle with most of the passengers and crew of the Admiral Sampson. The Admiral Sampson was bound from Seattle to Alaska. She had fifty-six passengers and a crew of sixty-five. The air was heavy with smoke and fog and it is supposed the collision was due to this cause. The Princess Victoria was bound from Victoria to Seattle. She makes no mention of damage to herself, in her brief report to her owners. If the boats were in the regular channel the Admiral Sampson must have gone down in very deep water and must be a total loss. It is inferred from the Princess' message that there was some loss of life. The Admiral Sampson sailed for Alaska at 10 o'clock last night. Among her passengers were: T. C. McCurnin of the Alaska-Gastineau Mining company, and twenty structural steel workers, for Juneau; James Wallace, private secretary to President H. F. Alexander of the Admiral line, and A. T. Budd and A. L. Button of New York City, round trip tourists.

Loss About \$200,000
The Admiral Sampson was a steel steamer of 2262 gross tonnage, built at Philadelphia in 1898 for the United Fruit company for use in the banana and tourist trade to the West Indies. She was purchased by the Pacific Alaska Navigation company several years ago and brought to Seattle via the Straits of Magellan.

HENEY SECURES NOMINATION FOR FEDERAL SENATE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 26.—Returns received this morning from yesterday's primary election changed the result indicated last night in but one important particular—Joseph R. Knowland has overcome the early lead of Samuel M. Shortridge for the republican nomination for United States senator and is himself in front by a wide margin.

John D. Fredericks has increased his lead over his three rivals for the republican nomination for governor and his plurality promises to reach the figure claimed by his managers—40,000.

For the democratic nomination for governor, Edward White remains in the lead, but the returns are meager, and a few precincts might reverse the standing of the leading candidates.

William Kent, independent, appears to have won the progressive nomination for congress in the first district, his name having been written in on the ballots extensively.

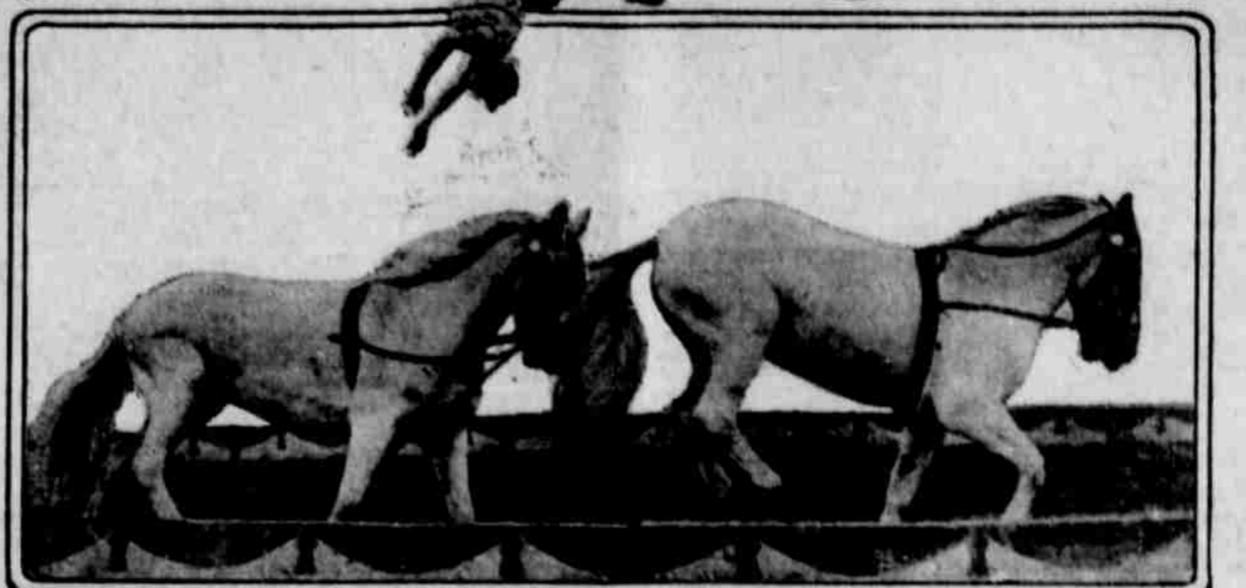
