**BRITISH MISSING  
 DEAD, WOUNDED,  
 FIGURES PUBLIC**

LONDON, Sept. 2, 1:15 p. m.—The official casualties suffered by the cavalry brigade and of the three divisions, less one brigade, of the British force in France follows:  
 Killed: Thirty six officers and 127 men.  
 Wounded: Fifty-seven officers and 629 men.  
 Missing: Ninety-five officers and 4,183 men.  
 This report was received in London from the headquarters in France of the expeditionary force.  
 As regards the men, as distinguished from officers, it is known that a considerable proportion of the missing were wounded men who had been down country, and regarding whom particulars were not available at headquarters.  
 The casualty lists as received include the names of officers only. The names will be given out publicly tomorrow.

**REPORT CAPTURE  
 GERMAN LLOYDER**

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—Sir Courtenay Bennett, British consul general in this city, announced this afternoon that he had been informed by a trustworthy friend that the North German Lloyd steamer Kron Prinz Wilhelm had been captured in nearby waters by the British flotilla of cruisers, and taken, a war prize, to Bermuda. His information, he said, had not been confirmed, but he thought it true.

**JAP MILITARY  
 FORCES ACTIVE**

SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 2.—Travelers who arrived here today from Japanese ports are responsible for some remarkable statements regarding the military activity of Japan.  
 They declare that, from their estimates, no fewer than fifty transports are loading 100,000 Japanese soldiers at Nagasaki, and they relate that some of the troops believe their destination to be Marseille.  
 The Japanese consul here denies any knowledge of these reports.

**ZEPPELIN LOSS AT  
 ANTWERP GIVEN LIE**

BERLIN, Sept. 1, via London, Sept. 2, 6:40 a. m.—An official denial has been issued to all foreign representatives that Zeppelins or other dirigibles have been shot down or otherwise lost.  
 The bourse governors will meet today (Wednesday) to discuss the question of re-opening the bourse for regular business in a limited number of securities. The brokers at the bourse Tuesday were optimistic. There were some private demands and a number of securities higher quotations.

**GERMAN FORTIFY PARISH  
 BELGIAN TROOPS TRAPPED**

LONDON, Sept. 2, 3:20 a. m.—The Daily Mail correspondent at Abbeville, France, telegraphed:  
 "The Germans have installed quick-firers in the villas all around Antwerp in order to prevent further sorties. A Belgian detachment of 350 men was surprised by a squad of these machine guns, which killed all but fifty of them. These particular guns were installed in a parish.

**SCANT COURTESY  
 SHOWN JAPS IN  
 BERLIN AT START**

TOKIO, Sept. 2.—The foreign office issued today a statement in which the treatment of Japanese in Germany is described. This announcement declares that as early as August 8 the Germans began watching all Japanese in Germany. The Japanese chare d'affaires at Berlin advised his nationals to leave the country; a number did depart, but on the expiration of the Japanese ultimatum the German authorities put fifty Japanese in prison, claiming that this action was taken for their "protection."  
 The civil authorities gave the Japanese charge permission to see his imprisoned countrymen, but the military authorities refused to let him do so. It was impossible to obtain their names and the American ambassador at Berlin, James W. Gerard, who represents Japanese interests, protested at this situation.  
 The foreign office statement declares also that the train on which the Japanese ambassador left Vienna was stoned and several of its windows were broken. This outrage, it says, was a result of the unbridled abuse of Japan in the Vienna newspapers.

**BRAND BELGIUM INSULT  
 BY ACTS TO ALL MEN**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The Socialist German paper Vorwaerts gives a shocking description of the wholesale assassination of Germans at Louvain. The Simplicissimus, another publication, says the name of Belgium is the worst insult that could be inflicted on civilized man.
