

MILITIA SEEKS HIDING SPOT OF BUTTE AGITATOR

BUTTE, Mont., Sept. 3.—Three important arrests were made this morning by the national guard of Montana, which has Butte under martial law. Two of the men now held prisoners, Alex McLean, known as the bodyguard of Mueky McDonald, president of the new miners' union, and Edward Evans, were taken at the point of guns on their way to the supposed hiding place of McDonald. The third man, Joe Shannon, who was picked up in the city, has been prominent in the new union.

McLean and Evans were armed. McLean had \$170, provisions for thirty days that he was carrying to McDonald, and a letter addressed to McDonald which had been written by a miner in the Coeur d'Alenes. The writer of the letter advised McDonald to "go strong and blow up a few buildings."

The men arrested today and the four taken yesterday will be tried by a military commission which is to be organized this afternoon. The commission will try all felony cases and a military court will try the misdemeanors. These will include the arrests made by the police. The seven Industrial Workers of the World members who were arrested in a raid on the I. W. W. headquarters early today will be taken before the military court.

McDonald, despite a twenty-four hour search, has so far eluded capture, but Major Donohue, commanding the militia, expects to hear of McDonald's arrest at any minute. With McDonald are two men, one of them J. E. Bradley, vice-president of the union, and another man who has not been identified.

SOCIALISTS ASK ITALY'S STAND

ROME, Sept. 1, via Paris, Sept. 3, 4:30 a. m.—A group of socialist and republican members of the chamber of deputies has presented an interpellation to the government asking whether it intends to "join in the protest of the United States" against what is described as Germany's repeated violations of international law during the present war.

The action by Italian deputies, referred to in the above dispatch, evidently is taken under the misapprehension that the United States has entered a protest concerning Germany's alleged violations of international conventions in Belgium.

CONFIRM REPORTS RUSS SUCCESS

PARIS, Sept. 3, 12:45 p. m.—A Havas agency dispatch from Antwerp contains the following official announcement by the Belgian government:

"The situation remains the same in the provinces of Antwerp and Limbourg. The Germans have set fire to several sets of farm buildings. M. Moychelen, attaché at the Russian embassy, confirms the report of the destruction of Lanoburg, Cessal and Rescholsheim by Russian cavalry and also that they had broken the lines of the enemy between Heilsberg (East Prussia, forty miles south of Königsberg) and Königsberg."

GERMAN CREW BATTLE WITH STEERAGE CROWD

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—A riot aboard the German steamer Bluecher, at anchor in the harbor of Pernambuco, Brazil, in which three of the Bluecher's crew and 50 of her 800 steerage passengers were killed was described today by passengers aboard the Brazilian steamer Sao Paulo on her arrival here from Brazilian ports, whence she sailed at the commencement of the European war.

AMERICAN CARDINALS AT ROME ON THURSDAY

ROME, Sept. 2, 2:30 p. m., via Paris, Sept. 3, 1:30 p. m.—Late reports received at Naples are that the White Star steamer Canopus, with Cardinals Gibbons and O'Connell aboard, will arrive there early on Thursday.

CHICAGO WHEAT PRICES RISE ON CHANGES IN WAR

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—Fear that the European war might spread brought about a further advance today in the price of wheat. It was confirmed that the British government had placed orders for heavy purchases of flour. After opening 5¢ to 2 1/4¢ higher, prices were close to the top level reached.

Corn rose with wheat. There was a good miscellaneous demand. The opening, which was 1 1/4 to 1 1/2¢ up, was followed by additional gains.

High sales to the seaboard made the oats market firm. On the bulge, however, there was considerable profit-taking by longs.

Provisions turned up grade after an early break, due to lower prices for hogs. The rally was influenced by the general advance in grain.

GERMANS INACTIVE EAST PRUSSIA

LONDON, Sept. 3, 4:30 a. m.—A dispatch to the Reuter Telegram company from Petrograd (St. Petersburg), gives the following official announcement:

"The battle on the east front in Galicia was participated in by the twelfth Austrian corps, which had only been transferred from the Roumanian frontier on August 1. The Austrian army has been reinforced by numerous bodies of the Landsturm."

"Our troops continue the offensive increasingly and our cavalry division has penetrated far into the interior of East Prussia, destroying means of communication. They have also a station in the Koeschen and Soldau and Sausburg."

"The German forces remain inactive."
