

# GERMAN WOUNDED TEN MORE TRIPS THRO' BRUSSELS TO CRATER LAKE

**OSTEND, Sept. 4, via London, 12:52 p. m.**—According to advices from Brussels, many convoys of German wounded from the south reached Brussels throughout Wednesday night. The German authorities have forbidden all traffic on the boulevard Botanique in order to prevent the public witnessing the arrival of wounded men.

Great activity on the railroads was to be seen on Thursday. Trains bearing German troops were constantly passing. All exit from the north side of Brussels has been interdicted.

The mayors of the various suburbs of the Belgian capital have been informed by the German military governor of Brussels that they will be held responsible for the maintenance of law and order and the holding of assemblies or hostile demonstrations. These officials are threatened, in the case of the slightest contravention of these orders, with the harshest measures not only against the guilty but the entire community.

Communication between Ostend and Paris is interrupted.

The Crater Lake Auto Stage will make ten more round trips to Crater Lake after this week. The year so far has been very successful with the best part of the season remaining for tourists to visit the lake. September is always a delightful month to visit this famous resort, as Crater Lake seems to be at its prettiest during the early autumn months.

The roads are dusty, but the cool weather makes the trip a most enjoyable one. Many local people are waiting for rain before visiting the lake this month.

In all probability the last two weeks will end with a rush to the lake. The Hall Taxi company will put on an extra auto stage September 15th to accommodate the tourists.

## AMENT FISH RACKS TO BE ABOLISHED

A telegram to George Putnam from Governor West announces that Henry O'Malley in charge of the government fish propagation on the Pacific coast has promised to remove the fish racks from the Ament dam, which means a suspension of operations by the government on the lower river.

For a number of years the government has blocked the fall run of steelhead and silver-side salmon by placing its racks across the lower river. This year a most vigorous protest was made by the Jackson county anglers to Senator Chamberlain and Governor West against these operations.

## ST. MARY'S SCHOOL OPENS SEPTEMBER 7

The high school department at St. Mary's Academy will re-open September 7 and offer the high school courses given below in the outline of the high school and junior collegiate courses of the schools of the Sisters of the Holy Names in Oregon and Washington. Where there are two or more subjects under a number in any of the courses, it is understood that these are elective subjects and choice is granted. Students must make the election of a course on entering the high school department and are not permitted to change it. Eighteen units of work are required for graduation from the standard high school course of four years for Catholic students, two of these being religious instruction. A unit is two semesters' work with recitation five times a week for 45 minutes.

In the following outline attention is called to the language and music course and the art course which will be of interest to pupils who wish to devote a great part of their time to music and art and yet obtain academic diplomas. As a matter of fact all music pupils of the academy whether of the high school department or not are taught theory, harmony and counterpoint, a regular conservatory course with junior certificate and senior diplomas being given.

## HORDES ABOUT PARIS STILL HOLDING OFF

PARIS, Sept. 4, 3:40 p. m.—It is officially announced that the opposing armies "around Paris have not come in contact. They continue their movements taking positions."

The statement adds: "The Germans have been checked at Verdun. The French are successful in Lorraine and the Vosges. The situation has not changed."
