# GERMAN WOUNDED ITEN MORE TRIPS THRO' BRUSSELS

OSTEND, Sept. 4, via London, 12:52 p. m .- According to advices from Brussels, many convoys of German wounded from the south reached Brussels throughout Wednesday night. The German authorities have forbidden all traffic on the boulevard Botanique in order to prevent the public witnessing the arrival of wounded men.

Great activity on the railroads was to be seen on Thursday. Trains bearing German troops were constantly passing. All exit from the north side of Brussels has been interdicted.

The mayors of the various suburbs of the Belgian capital have been informed by the German military governor of Brussels that they will be held responsible for the maintenance of local order and the holding of as-These officials are threatened, in the case of the slightest contravention of these orders, with the harshest measures not only against the guilty but the entire community.

Communication between Ostend and Paris is interrupted.
