

WHEAT REACHES HIGHEST PRICE OF WAR SELLING

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—Although higher prices than any before since hostilities began, were scored today in the wheat market here, the advance met with determined opposition.

There was free selling by several of the largest houses on 'change, and in addition considerable profit-taking was indulged in by miscellaneous holders.

Oats continued to show unusual activity. Short covering strengthened provisions. Lower quotations for hogs were virtually ignored.
