

FISHERIES BUREAU DISCONTINUES WORK AT AMENT DAM

Senator G. E. Chamberlain has written under date of September 2 to local anglers: "Further to my letter of the 29th ultimo on the subject, permit me to enclose herewith for your information copy of a detailed statement I have just received from the commissioner of fisheries, from which you will see that after considering the numerous protests filed with him from commercial bodies and others along the Rogue river, the bureau has decided to discontinue its fish cultural operations on that stream.

"Hon. Geo. E. Chamberlain, United States senate, Washington, D. C. "Dear Sir: In reply to your letter of August 31, after giving the matter careful consideration, the bureau has decided to discontinue its fish cultural operations on the lower Rogue river at Ament dam, in Josephine county, Oregon. The action taken is based on information received from the field superintendent in charge of the Pacific coast salmon operations, to the effect that the operations on the lower Rogue river during the past two years have been unsuccessful, and that the work this year was undertaken by the superintendent immediately in charge, contrary to his advice.

"It is of course understood that the construction of racks in the various salmon streams to intercept the run of salmon and trout is absolutely necessary for the successful prosecution of fish cultural work. Usually such racks are constructed at the headwaters of streams near the natural spawning grounds, and the salmon intercepted are of no commercial value, and in fact are not in condition for edible purposes. The method pursued in the conduct of operations on the lower Rogue river were identical to those employed at other points, the general plan involving fish cultural operations on an extensive

STEAMER PRIZES AT HONG KONG

SHANGHAI, Sept. 7.—Hong Kong reports the arrival there of a number of prizes, including the steamer Hanamet and the German steamers Paklat, Frisia and Rajabari.

The prize crew of the Paklat heads the German engineers' work for three days at the point of revolvers, and frustrated an attempt to disable the engines.

The American steamer Hanamet, 2020 tons burden, is owned by W. K. Atz of Shanghai. The Paklat and the Rajabari are owned by the North German Lloyd, the former being of 1277 tons burden and the Rajabari 1189 tons. The Frisia is a ship of 3150 tons.

Both the Hanamet and the Frisia have previously been reported as having been seized. The Hanamet is suspected of carrying contraband. Her owner has appealed to the American consul at Shanghai for indemnification.

DEATH'S HEAD HAZZARS DEFEAT IN POLAND

LONDON, Sept. 7, 4:23 a. m.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Daily Mail dated Sunday says that the obscure Gazette reports that a squadron of Death's Head hazzars, of which the crown prince was commander during his stay at Danzig was defeated and completely cut up near Roczecin, in Poland. Count Cziolberg, the commander of the squadron, and all the other officers were among the fallen.

GERMANS PLAN TO OPERATE LIEGE GUN FACTORIES

LONDON, Sept. 7, 3:37 a. m.—A dispatch to the Chronicle from Amsterdam says that the Germans are preparing to reopen immediately the gun factories at Coekerril, near Liege. These factories, covering 375 acres, were one of the richest prizes captured by the Germans in the war.

The whole concern has been taken over by the Prussian war office, which has offered the Belgian workmen 50 per cent increase in wages to remain at their places.
