Thursday is also Ashland day and it is expected the people of the Granite city will do as well by Medford in the way of attendance as our people did by Ashland on Medford day at the Chautauqua.

The officers of the fair and assistants are busy getting things in shape at the grounds, the fast horses are arriving for the races and if the people do their duty in making exhibits and attending the fair will be a huge success. The officers offer good premiums on everything and its up to the people to make good.

DIME FARE TO THE COUNTY FAIR GROUNDS

For the benefit of both exhibitors and visitors, the Fair association announces that arrangements have been made for a 10 cent fare to the grounds.

Exhibitors will be received only on Wednesday, between 8 a. m. and 6 p. m., and every facility for displaying the exhibits effectively will be provided, but all exhibitors of poultry or stock must provide their own feed.

Exhibitors will not be required to pay entry fees, nor to purchase season tickets, the entry fee of 20 per cent being deducted from the money awarded.

No prizes will be awarded for any exhibit which does not comply with the classifications given in the catalogue, but special exhibits will be welcome, and will be judged according to their merit.

On Friday the schools will be closed to allow the school children to visit the fair after the awards are made and before the exhibits are disturbed and on that day the admission for children will be only 10 cents. The stores will also be closed Friday afternoon.

I am now writing by electric light and find that it is past my bedtime so will stop for this time. I have just returned from a three days tour up the Little Butte Creeks and will try to tell something of what I saw and heard on that trip.

ASHLAND ITEMS

Charles Butterfield died at the Lindsay ranch, east of Ashland, on Sunday. He had been in a decline for some time, and with his mother was rusticated in the forest section on account of health conditions. He was a brother of H. G. Butterfield, engineer of the municipal electric light system. He was buried in the vicinity of the Lindsay homestead.

The fall equinoctial put in an appearance ahead of time. Quite a rain fell Sunday night, intermittent showers continuing all day Monday. A bit of fresh frosting has been added to the holdover snow on the summit of Mount Ashland.

In spite of a shortage in the peach crop, shipments have been fairly up to normal and the fruit extra fine. August is the lively month in the forwarding movement. During that period the Ashland Fruit and Produce association's major shipments were three earloads. Wells-Fargo handled 12,000 boxes as against 14,000 in August, 1913. The most of these express shipments were through the fruit association channels. Individual shippers forwarded about 5000 boxes, over 1000 of which went by parcel post. A new departure here, especially on that big scale. To this aggregate should be added the amount retained in the stores, loaded about town and handled by the cannery. The favorite varieties are Crawfords, Mairs, Golden Clings, Yellow Firestones and Strawberry. September shipments will be considerable.

Miss Frances McWilliams, for a long time connected with the Ashland school, but who for the past year has been teaching at Calexico, Cal., returns to her field this week, accompanied by her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Peck, Calexico is on the Mexican border and was included in the danger zone during the late unpleasantness. A fair proportion of Miss McWilliams' pupils are Mexican children, and she reports them as being eager to learn and verging up well with American children in their studies.

The first instance of a casket being shipped by parcel post into this territory occurred recently. It arrived at the local postoffice last Saturday from Portland, having been consigned to a firm of Ashland undertakers. Until delivery by special carrier a sombre and funeral atmosphere pervaded postal headquarters here.

A big dual event will be the annual convocation of the Grand Commandery of Oregon, also a Shrine ceremonial to be held by Hillah Temple, both of which occur in this city Sept. 24th. The commandery gathering will bring Templars here from all over the state while the ceremonial promises to summon hordes of the faithful from various oases up and down the coast. Masonic hall is being placed in condition to resist a heavy siege during the threatened invasion. "Bring your feet!"

B. W. Talcott has resigned his position with the Tidings and will re-instate the job printing plant which he formerly operated. Addison Bennett, staff writer for the Oregonian, was in the city recently. The result is a two-column illustrated article on Ashland in that daily of Saturday. The write-up deals mainly with the mineral springs development feature in this vicinity.

War's alarms do not pass unheeded even amid Ashland's quiet and peaceful surroundings. The Record with characteristic enterprise, has installed a United Press dispatch service, the bulletins of which are posted twice daily at the two leading public places, one in the vicinity of the postoffice and another at the Elks' building. The bulletins are supplemented by up-to-date maps of scenes and situations at the seat of war.

Mrs. D. G. Platt enters the employment of the Record this week, preliminary to an engagement as literary and society editor of that paper. Up till lately she has filled a similar position with Medford dailies. Medford is after Ashland's goat.
