BUTTE, Mont., Sept. 9.—D. J. Waidner, a barber, was sent to jail for sixty days by Judge Advocate Major Jess R. Major Roote declared Waidner guilty of insulting the governor, the United States army and the uniform of the National Guard, and with heaping indignity upon the American flag.
