

ASHLAND ITEMS

Harry Hooley, the noted expert fisherman in these parts, returned Wednesday from coaching a bunch of amateur anglers in landing the wary trout from Rogue river water. Good success attended the party.

Among residents who are taking prolonged vacations to distant points are Miss Lydia McCall, of the local postoffice, and Miss Nina Emery of Vaupe's clerical force, who have joined in an outing to British Columbia and Washington points. Mrs. C. A. Malone, wife of the resident manager of the California-Oregon Light and Power company, is visiting the scene of her childhood in western Iowa. Mrs. W. M. Barber, wife of the foreman of the Tidings, has gone to the Atlantic seaboard, where she will visit at her old home in the vicinity of Greensboro, North Carolina, and also at various points in Ohio.

The municipal water supply through out the summer has been superb and still continues undiminished into the autumn months. There have been no restrictions placed upon consumers, as is generally the case, in spite of the long dry spell, there having been no rain of any consequence since June 25. These ideal conditions are due to two causes, first an extra heavy snowfall last winter, and second the foresight in engineering which substituted an extra large conduit over Crown hill in place of two smaller ones. This has had the effect of equalizing as well as adding to the pressure in the several zones of the system.

The Commercial club has now over 265 active members.
