SEND TRANSPORTS TO VERA CRUZ FOR FUNSTON'S ARMY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Preparations were being made today for the withdrawal of the American military forces from Vera Cruz, who have held the city since last May, in connection with President Wilson's orders of evacuation.

AUSTRIANS CLAIM SERBIAN DEFEAT

VIENNA, Sept. 16, via London, 12:44 p. m.—General Hofer, deputy chief of the Austrian general staff, announced today that the Serbian army which crossed the river Save into Hungary had been defeated along its entire line and that Szerem, in Slavonia, and Banat were now clear of the enemy.

ROAD OPENED TO BUDA PEST

LONDON, Sept. 16, 11:22 a. m.—The Petrograd correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company quotes the military expert critic Michaelowsky as saying that Russia's victory during the last week over three Austrian armies on the line from the Vistula to the Carpathians leaves the road to Buda Pest, along the northern base of the Carpathians, completely open.

TO TRY PREISKER FOR HIS CRUELTY

PARIS, Sept. 16, 11:45 a. m.—In a dispatch from Petrograd, the correspondent of the Havas agency says that Lieutenant Preisker, former German commander at Kalisz, Russian Poland, recently taken prisoner, has been brought before a court martial to answer for the atrocities alleged to have been committed when German troops entered that town.

SERVIANS OCCUPY VISHEGRAD IN BOSNIA

PARIS, Sept. 16, 3:44 a. m.—A dispatch to the Havas agency from Nish, Serbia, confirms the reports that the Servians have occupied Vishegrad, in Bosnia, forty miles southeast of Sarajevo.

WOUNDED GERMANS PERISH EN ROUTE TO HOSPITAL

PARIS, Sept. 16, 2:55 p. m.—Out of 760 wounded Germans who arrived at La Rochelle yesterday, 151 were in such a grave state that they could not be transferred from the station to the hospital, and several died during the day.

OLYMPIAN COMMISSIONER SULLIVAN PASSES AWAY

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—James E. Sullivan, secretary and treasurer of the Amateur Athletic Union, and American Olympic commissioner in recent Olympic games, died here today.

WHEAT SHARPLY ADVANCE WITH CORN

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—Wheat advanced sharply today, principally on account of higher quotations at Liverpool. Reports that representatives of foreign governments were bidding for 100,000 barrels of flour tended also to lift the market.

MORE BATTLES FOR GERMANS SCHEDULED

PARIS, via London, Sept. 16, 10:30 a. m.—The Matin, discussing the withdrawal of the Germans, points out that in order to cover its retreat and avoid the blocking of roads open to the German army will have to mark time and fight a second and perhaps a third battle.

KAISER TO COMMAND IN EAST PRUSSIA

PARIS, via London, Sept. 16, 10:22 a. m.—The Petit Journal prints a telegram from Berlin via Copenhagen, stating that the German emperor will proceed to East Prussia and assume chief command against the Russians.
