ASHLAND AND VICINITY

Preliminary to holding the 28th annual convocation of the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar, of Oregon, the members of that organization, with the exception of the grand treasurer, arrived here in a body on Wednesday afternoon. The party came in the Pullman "Westville," which had been chartered for the trip. It has been parked in the local motor yards and will remain here until the return Friday morning. Over a score of ladies accompanied the delegation. The local Knights, headed by the grand, escorted the visitors to Masonic hall. Wednesday evening a reception was held at lodge headquarters, attended by the visiting and local knights and ladies. It was a brilliant social affair in keeping with the prominence of the event, which it signaled most auspiciously. The grand commandery opened its sessions at 10 a. m. Thursday, closing at 4 p. m., after which the Shrine will appear on the scene with a parade, closing with a ceremonial session at the armory, an event which is supposed to cap the climax in festival annals. The town is gaily decorated, the cross of the Templars and the crescent of the Shrine being everywhere in evidence, mingled with red, orange, yellow and black color effects.

The family was of Quaker descent and the funeral services will take place at Guthrie, according to the tenets of that faith, interment being in Harmony cemetery.
