## ASHLAND AND VICINITY

Templar Masonry held a most successful gathering here Thursday. The event was the twenty-eighth annual conclave of the grand commandery of Oregon Knights Templar. Business sessions opened at Masonic hall at 10 a. m., presided over by Grand Commander Leonard L. Jewell of Melita commandery. Grants Pass, James F. Robinson of Portland recorded the official proceedings. Out of seventeen commanderies in the state, fifteen were represented by delegates, including Portland, Eugene, Albany, Ashland, Salem, La Grande, Pendleton, Grants Pass, Baker, Marshfield, Astoria, Hood River, Roseburg and Klamath Falls.

Five past grand commanders were present, including D. P. Mason of Albany, termed the "father of the grand commandery"; De Witt C. Agler, Ashland; C. B. Winn, Albany; Thos. C. Taylor, Pendleton; James F. Robinson, Portland.

Among notable visitors were James H. Tapscott of Yreka, grand commander, and Elmer E. Stone of San Francisco, captain general, both of the California Templar jurisdiction.

Every officer of the Oregon grand body was present except the treasurer, John B. Cleland, of Portland.

The morning session was devoted to the grand commander's address; also the reports of the treasurer and secretary, which were referred.

As predicted, Dillon Bostic Grant of Ashland was elected grand commander. He is the present deputy of the head of the Templars in this state. He is a native of Ohio and is 57 years of age. Has been a resident of Ashland for the past nine years, though temporarily located in Portland. Locally, he is affiliated with Ashland Lodge, No. 23, A. F. & A. M.; Siskiyou chapter, No. 21, R. A. M.; Malta commandery, No. 4, K. T., and Hillah Temple, A. A. O. N. U. S., in all of which bodies he has held important offices. The other elective and appointive officers are as follows:

Y., who arrived Thursday noon with his official suite, representative Shriner from Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Kansas City, St. Paul and Minneapolis. A loving cup and goblets, manufactured from myrtle wood, were presented to him as a momento of his visit. These were made at Marshfield and were the gift of the Shriner club of that city.
