MRS. McNULTY JAILED AT BOISE

Mrs. Fannie McNulty, charged with defrauding the Jackson County bank out of \$380 by means of a certificate of deposit belonging to Mrs. Sarah Collins, was arrested at Boise, Idaho, this morning by the police of that city, and is being held for the arrival of local authorities.

Both women are well known in this city, Mrs. McNulty having relatives living near Eagle Point. She is alleged to have taken the deposit certificate from the bottom of Mrs. Collins' trunk, cashed it and then departed. It is expected that she will resist extradition.

The cashing of the certificate at the Jackson County bank was traced to Mrs. McNulty through the signature on a bill of sale for stock sold by her just before departure. The evidence was collected through the Pinkerton detective agency of Portland.

New developments in the case are expected when Mrs. McNulty tells her side of the story.

Pescow Captured
The isolation of the Galician strong hold of Przemyel, heretofore emphasized in dispatches from Petrograd as forecasting a triumphant Russian march to Cracow and thence to Vienna and Buda Pest, apparently has been made complete by the occupation of Pescow, 20 miles south of Przemyel and cloth to the junction of railroad lines connecting with Jaroslau, the important railroad center taken by the Russian troops some time ago.

On the British Isles the public is awaiting with keen interest the outcome of Premier Asquith's appeal to the Irish as voted in Dublin last night. With a Welsh army corps already in a tentative stage of formation, Englishmen believe that the Irish will not be outdone.

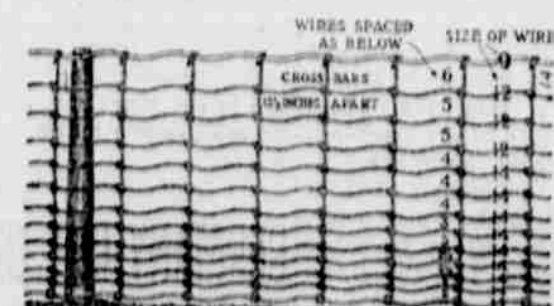
