

NEWS FROM COUNTRY CORRESPONDENTS

ASHLAND AND VICINITY

Friday afternoon was a gala occasion, universally observed as "Normal Day." Schools and stores were closed, and everybody flocked themselves to the spacious grounds for an afternoon's frolic. It is estimated that over 2500 people were present, and 50 autos were kept in commission hauling the crowds to and fro. There was a melon feed, also various games. In the tug of war and baseball throw, girls of the Bellevue school district came off victorious. City high school girls won the basketball throw. The bucking contest was won by Jim Bowers and Lawrence Martin. Ray Murphy came out first in the Roman ride and running race. Greatest interest centered in a boxing match between Dr. Geo. O. Jarvis, representing Germany, and A. L. Strickland handling the gloves for Belgium, with J. K. Chouteau, referee. The decision was a draw after four rounds, result nearly causing the mobbing of referee, inasmuch as the physician put up a losing fight from the start. In the refreshment line 150 huge melons were devoured on the spot. The only speech was made by Hon. B. F. Mulkey, of Medford, he having been introduced by County Superintendent Wells, of Medford. He spoke from a platform hallowed by old associations, and it is needless to add that his remarks were in keeping with the aim of restoring to the normal school the prestige which it enjoyed in former days. He was its former president.

Deputy Sheriff Brown of Alameda county California, with headquarters at Oakland, arrived Thursday afternoon, and returned Friday, talking with him Lynn Simpson, the young man whose testimony is needed as a material witness in untangling the web of the Livermore murder mystery. While here the genial official was the recipient of courtesies at the hands of the local police department in the way of a trip-out to the mineral springs between trains.

The mineral springs protest bonds are not sold, neither have they been rejected as yet by financiers. In spite of reports to the contrary. In view of the questions involved, the springs water commission has referred the question of their validity to experts in such matters, the firm being Dillon, Thomson & Clay, of New York City, attorneys at law, especially well versed in these details. This firm has been supplied with facts concerning the city's status in general, but has written for more information which will be forthcoming at once. In the meantime the matter is simply being held up pending developments later on. The issue is for \$175,000, the interest rate being five per cent.
