PETTY POLITICS FORCED TRANNA TO QUIT BERTH

Petty politics forced Water Superintendent George Tranna to resign, according to his resignation filed with Mayor Purdin Monday afternoon, and accepted by the council at a special meeting last night. City Engineer Araspiger was named to fill the vacancy, provided his duties as street commissioner and city engineer do not suffer.

Tranna's resignation says "obstacles much to his displeasure" have been put in his path by members of the council. Then Mayor Purdin, and Councilmen Porter, Miles and Hargreaves are thanked for their cooperation. The two unthankeds are Councilmen Sargent, Medynski and Emerick, hence it is inferred they caused the "obstacles" heretofore mentioned. Both have shown extreme interest in water affairs lately, and a week ago Councilman Medynski charged "stupidity" in the laying of the water pipe as the cause of leaks near the intake.

Another point was the purchase of Wm. Ulrich's cash register for \$150, and the refusal to buy material for the water department for some time on the grounds of economy.

Tranna held the water superintendency for more than three years. He said yesterday he was "disgusted" and that owing to strained conditions he decided to accept a position in California, that offered more chance for advancement.

Enforcement of water regulations during the summer months made Tranna the storm center, and friends assert that this formed the nucleus that led to his retirement.

Mr. Tranna's letter of resignation is as follows:

To the Honorable Mayor and Council, Medford, Oregon, Gentlemen:

In view of the fact that some members of your Honorable Body have been disposed to force petty politics into the affairs of the department of which I have been superintendent of four years and realizing that the discipline of the department is being shattered and its system and organization being disrupted, in the effort to pay off political obligations, and realizing that I must either be a party to this method of doing business or be in constant turmoil, I prefer to give up the office while the more desirable positions are available. Therefore, I submit my resignation, to take effect within thirty days.

To you, Mr. Mayor, and Councilmen Porter, Hargrave and Miles, I take advantage of this occasion to express my appreciation for your support at all times and your firm stand for clean politics.

CRUISER SOUTH DAKOTA TO BE SENT TO NAVY YARD

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 29.—The cruiser South Dakota sailed today from the Puget Sound navy yard for the Mare island navy yard to be overhauled. She took with her all the spare men, of all ratings, in the reserve fleet. These men will be transferred to the repair ship Prometheus and the ships on the west coast of Mexico.

The gunboat Concord is being stripped at the Puget Sound yard and will be towed to Astoria for use as a quarantine ship. When the Concord was completed in 1891 she was considered one of the finest boats of the navy because of her speed, armament and modernness.

ANTWERP SIEGE NEXT MOVE

The large German siege guns have all been removed to the Alsne battlefield and the guns which Germany intends to use for Antwerp are of Austrian make and were brought to Belgium on Austrian railroad trucks.

The northern part of Belgium, which is still under the immediate control of the Belgian government, is perfectly quiet. All cities and villages along the frontier at night are kept in absolute darkness to avoid attacks from Zeppelins, which are cruising over this territory almost every night.

City Well Fortified

The fortifications of Antwerp are considered among the strongest in the world. The city has been fortified since the middle of the sixteenth century. In 1850, 28 years after the taking of the city by English and French troops, Brialmont, the noted Belgian fort builder, supervised the re-fortification of the city and since 1877 it has had a line of forts well out from interdefenses.

Belgian Commission to Sail

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The Belgian commission, appointed to place before President Wilson alleged instances of German atrocities in Belgium, will sail for home tomorrow on the White Star liner Adriatic.

QUAIL SEASON OPENS OCTOBER 1

The open season for quail begins Thursday, October 1, and many hunters are ready for the field. Game Warden Hubbard has issued a warning against shooting bob white quail, Hungarian partridges, and grouse. Chinese pheasants must not be shot. There is no open season on them. Several ranchers have served notice against hunters. The season lasts thirty days. Most of those posting trespass notices say the depredations of past years made the step imperative.

The following state laws and regulations govern bird hunting:

Open season for milk China pheasants is October 1 to October 31, except that there is no open season on Chinese pheasants in Jackson, Josephine and Coos counties. There is no open season on Bob White quail.

Open season for ducks and geese, federal law now in force, October 1 to January 15.

Open season on shore birds, federal law now in force, October 1 to December 15.

To rob birds' nests except such birds as are not protected by law.

To hunt without having hunting license on person, and to refuse to show same on demand of proper officer or owner or representative of real property where hunting.

To hunt at night.

To sell or have in possession plumage of protected birds.

To hunt on any game reservation.

To disguise sex or kind of any game.

To sell game of any kind except when propagated according to law.

To shoot game from public highways or railroad right of way.

To wantonly waste game.

For aliens to hunt without a special gun license.

To shoot from any power, sink or sneak boat or sink box.

To hunt on enclosed, or occupied uninclosed lands without permission of owner.

To hunt between February 15 and September 15, excepting by permit from state game warden.

To trap, net or ensnare game animals, birds or fish, except as expressly provided.

To hunt within the corporate limits of any city or town, public park or cemetery, or any campus or grounds of any public school, college or university, or within the boundaries of any watershed reservation as set aside by the United States to supply water to cities, or within any national bird or game reservation.
