

PORTLAND JOINS "FARM-TO-TABLE" POSTAL CITIES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Seattle, Portland, Ore., Denver and Los Angeles were added today to the list of cities which will receive the "farm-to-the-table" service of the parcels post.

MARSHALL OF FRANCE RECREATED

LONDON, Oct. 1, 7:40 a. m.—Although at the present moment there is no marshal of France, says a Bordeaux dispatch to the Havas agency, a decree dated September 29 fixes the salary of this post at 30,000 francs (\$48,000).

BORAH ATTACKS CLAYTON BILL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1. The fight on the Clayton trust bill conference report was continued today with Senator Borah leading the attack. He contended the democratic anti-trust program was a reversal of strict statutory prohibition of monopoly as expressed in the Sherman law and was a step toward regulation of monopolies and restraints by commissions.

FIRST SHIPMENT OF GOLD TO CANADA

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—The first shipment of gold to Ottawa, Canada, for account of the one hundred million dollar gold pool raised to pay indebtedness abroad was made today when \$5,000,000 in coin and bars was taken from the sub-treasury and assay office. It is the purpose of the managers of the fund to ship at least \$25,000,000 to Canada by the middle of the month.

8000 MORE NAMES OF GERMAN LOSSES

BERLIN, Oct. 1, via The Hague and London, 3:35 p. m.—The 38th German casualty list made public today continues about 8000 names. It includes three major generals, one killed and two wounded. Major General Schoenbein was killed, while Major General Emil Henigst was slightly and Major General Oskar Reuter, was dangerously wounded.

REPUBLICANS OPPOSE RECESS OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Republicans of the senate oppose the democratic plan for recess of congress from October 10 to November 16 and are insisting on adjournment. Some democrats favor adjournment. Nothing was decided today.

ROCKEFELLER TO PAY FOR PROBE OF LABOR WORLD

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—The Rockefeller Foundation announced today that it had decided to make a far-reaching investigation of industrial conditions in this county, and that it had retained the services of W. L. Mackenzie King, former minister of labor in Canada, as director of investigations.

"In facing the problem of industrial conditions, the Rockefeller Foundation is deliberately attempting to grapple with what it believes to be the most complicated and at the same time the most urgent question of modern times and it is precisely for this reason that the investigation has been instituted.

"In no sense will the investigation be local or restricted, or carried on with particular reference to any existing situation, or for that matter, with reference to conditions in any one country. The experience of the several countries of the world will be drawn on.

KRUPPS DENIED BRITISH RECEIVER

LONDON, Oct. 1, 2:35 p. m.—The high court denied today the application made on behalf of a British creditor of the German gun-making firm of Krupp, to appoint a receiver for the firm's assets in England, which are estimated at more than \$1,000,000.

CROWN PRINCESS TO DECORATE DRAGOONS

LONDON, Oct. 1, 5:50 p. m.—In a dispatch from Berlin, sent by way of The Hague, the correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company says that Cecilie, the German crown princess, accompanied by her two eldest sons, have left Berlin to join the crown prince at his headquarters in France. She purposes personally to bestow decorations on officers of her dragoon regiment.

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK OFF PERUVIAN COAST

CALLAO, Peru, Oct. 1.—The Kosmos steamer Marie arrived here today with the crew of the British steamer Bankfields, which was sunk by the German cruiser Leipzig off Eten, Peru.
