

AUSTRIAN WAR LEADER SUFFERS FROM CHOLERA

PARIS, Oct. 1, 6:15 a. m.—It is officially announced by Austria Hungary, says a dispatch from Rome, that General Von Auenburg is ill.

LONDON, Oct. 1, 10:10 a. m.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Rome states that General Von Auenburg is suffering from cholera, according to a message from Vienna.

General Von Auenburg was Austrian minister of war from 1911 to the time the war broke out. With General Dankl he began an offensive movement in Russian Poland and had preliminary successes, invading Russian territory as far as Lublin.

The Austrian reverse at Lemberg, however, changed the situation in the north and for a time the position of General Von Auenburg's army was said to be precarious, as the Russians threatened to cut him off. By desperate fighting, the general managed to retreat safely to Rzesow, Galicia, where he again formed a junction with General Dankl, and the two armies retired towards Tarnow and Cracow. The last definite news received of General Von Auenburg was that he was commanding the center of a new and extensive front with his base at Tarnow.

FAREWELL RECEPTION TO REV. ELDRIDGE

Mr. Eldridge, who has just been appointed pastor of one of the prominent churches of Portland. Hill in his remarks referred to the very high esteem in which Mr. Eldridge is held, not only by his own people, but by those outside of church and who regret his leaving. He referred to the large congregations that attend his preaching, to the increased membership during his pastorate, to the splendid Sunday school and Bible class and to a marked improvement on all lines of church work during the three years he has been its pastor.

The Rev. Mr. Tucker, pastor of the First Christian church, also spoke of the great help Mr. Eldridge had been to him, of how highly he appreciated the friendship which existed between them, of the many kindly things he had heard of him, both as a preacher and a pastor, and that he was voicing the feelings of the best people in Medford when he said that he was very sorry to see him leave when he was most needed.

Refreshments were served in the basement and a very delightful evening was spent.

Should it be classed as a warship, the United States might be charged with responsibility for its departure from a neutral port. No protest has been made and the vexing question has not yet come up officially.

RUSSIANS REPEL ATTACK OF GERMAN FLEET AT WINDAU

PARIS, Oct. 1, 6:35 a. m.—A Petrograd special to the Havas Agency, dated Sept. 30, says:

"The details of the naval engagement which took place Sept. 24 off the coast at Windau, a Russian seaport in Courland on the Baltic, have been made public. It appears that a German squadron, comprising 40 ships of all classes, appeared off the harbor and was prevented from landing forces by the heavy fire from the forts. One officer and two sailors were killed and three more were drowned.

"The ships withdrew, but on the day following two cruisers returned, opened fire and destroyed the lighthouse. They killed a civilian and a number of soldiers, but were driven off again by the fire from the forts."
