SERVIANS LOSE TWO DAYS BATTLE

LONDON, Oct. 9, 1:10 p. m .- The Austrian war office made the following official announcement under date of October 8, says a dispatch to the Reuter Telegram company from Vienna, coming by way of Amster-

"To the already announced succeases against the Montenegrin troops now is added a direct blow against the Servian troops, who invaded Bosnia at Vishegrad. Their northern column from Srebrenitza, moving against Bajna and Basta, already has been repulsed and driven across the Drina with the loss of their supply

"The main Servian forces who ad vanced on Roumania and Planina under command of General Mylos Bo janovic, former minister of war were routed by our troops in an engagement which lasted two days and only escaped capture by hasty flight. One battalion of the Eleventh Regiment and several quick-fire gun were captured.

TOHN D. ROCKEFELLER claims that the fight against the coal miners in Colorado is a fight to maintain the rights of the laborer to work for whom and what he pleases-in other words, to maintain the independence of the workingman.

Who believes that?

Under the fellow-servant doctrine as established by the courts, if the death of one employe was caused by the care lessness of another employe, that was a complete defense. and the widow and children could go beg or starve.

Under that doctrine the courts had held that if the roadbed of a railroad gave way and the engineer and firemen were killed, the railroad company had nothing to pay, because the section men were fellow-servants of the engineer and firemen.
