

EX-SHERIFF JONES LOSES FARM PAYING OFFICE SHORTAGE

Ex-Sheriff Wilbur A. Jones returned Wednesday from Klamath Falls where he closed a deal for a three year's lease of the Ankeny ranch located four miles from Klamath Falls. Mr. and Mrs. Jones and family will leave for their new home in the near future. Mr. Jones says he is not leaving Jackson county from choice but from necessity. He says Rogue river valley has been his home for over 40 years and his wife has lived here all her life, so they feel that no other spot can mean "home."

Two years ago Mr. Jones mortgaged his fine farm and home on Ross Lane in order to pay the \$21,000.00 shortage in the sheriff's office discovered at the close of his second term as sheriff of Jackson county. The mortgagee now owns the farm—Jackson county is paid up full—and Mr. Jones is penniless.

The county court ordered an investigation of the affair but were unable to unearth evidence sufficient to apprehend the robbers. The affair will soon be only a matter of past history and perhaps the greatest crime ever committed in Jackson county will be forgotten by all save by the men who stole the money and whose guilty conscience will give them no peace—and by one other—the man who sacrificed his all that the county might not lose and who now in middle life starts in at the foot of the ladder to retrieve his stolen fortune.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Jones sympathize with them in their misfortune and wish them God-speed in their new field of endeavor.

ZEPPELIN STRUCK FLYING OVER CITY

LONDON, Oct. 9, 3:50 p. m.—The Evening Star's Antwerp correspondent, telegraphing by way of Amsterdam says that eye witnesses of the Zeppelin flights over Antwerp insist that they saw one such craft hit by shells from the forts and fall to the earth.

During the bombardment of Antwerp Thursday night it is estimated that shells fell at the rate of 20 a minute. Many civilians were killed.

In addition to the law courts and the museum which were damaged by shells, fire broke out at many points in the city.

AERIAL RAID UPON ZEPPELIN STATIONS MADE BY ALLIES

LONDON, Oct. 9, 10:58 a. m.—According to a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam, another aerial raid has been made by the allies on Cologne and Dusseldorf, both important Zeppelin airship bases. The telegram follows:

"A dispatch from Cologne states that hostile aeroplanes threw bombs at the Zeppelin hangars at Cologne and Dusseldorf on Thursday afternoon. The former was uninjured, but damage was inflicted at Dusseldorf."

The previous aerial raid on Cologne and Dusseldorf was made by British naval airmen from Belgium September 23. The attack on Dusseldorf was officially reported as successful. Lieut. C. H. Collet dropped three bombs there on the Zeppelin shed, sweeping down to within 400 feet of his target. The attack on Cologne at that time, like the one reported in the foregoing dispatch, apparently failed so far as inflicting any damage is concerned.

DE WOLF HOPPER PAID UNIQUE TRIBUTE

A concert unique in the history of the famous Greek Theater of the University of California was given this afternoon, when De Wolf Hopper and the members of the Gilbert & Sullivan Opera company appeared in "Trial by Jury" and gave a program of the most celebrated vocal and instrumental gems from the Gilbert & Sullivan comic operas. The affair was a great success, the huge open-air playhouse being thronged. President Benjamin Ide Wheeler and members of the faculty were present. The effects and costumery reflected great credit on the producer, Mr. William A. Brady. It was the first professional presentation of "Trial by Jury" in this country for 39 years.

Mr. Hopper was signally honored in being invited by the University of California to appear within the classic precincts of the edifice that had known Sarah Bernhardt's "Phedre" and Maude Adams' "As You Like It," for no comic opera star had previously played the Greek Theater.

NACO, Ariz., Oct. 9.—Trooper Wilson of the tenth United States cavalry, wounded by a Mexican bullet fired across the line during an attack on Naco, Sonora, Sunday, died today at Fort Huachuca. Wilson was shot in the breast.

AUSTRIANS CLAIM RUSSIAN ATTACKS ON PRZEMYSL FAIL

VIENNA, Oct. 8, via Amsterdam and London, Oct. 9, 11:20 a. m.—The following official announcement signed by General Hofer, deputy chief of the general staff, was given out at Vienna today:

"Our troops have made further advances and yesterday they repulsed the enemy on the road to Przemysl, near Barycz, west of Dynow. Przemysl has been recaptured and guns have been retaken."

"In the territory between the River Vistula and the River San we took many prisoners from the fleeing Russians."

"The renewed violent attacks on Przemysl have been splendidly repulsed and the enemy's dead and wounded were counted by the thousands."

"We have had victorious battles at Sziget, in Marmaros county, Hungary and in East Galicia. The landstrom and the Polish legionaries rivalled each other in gallantry."

AUSTRALIA TO GIVE BELGIUM \$500,000

MELBOURNE, via London, Oct. 9, 7:19 a. m.—At the opening of the federal parliament today the government announced that parliament would be invited to make Belgium a free gift of half a million dollars in recognition of her sacrifices.

JAPANESE MOUNT GUNS AT TSING TAU

These forts are named Bismarck, Moltke and Illis and are between three and four miles from the mountain.
