## DRAMA LEAGUE ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS ON THE DEATH OF MRS. BURKE

At a directors meeting of the Medford center of the Drama League held at the library on Friday evening, October 9th, the following resolution was adopted:

The directors of the Medford Center of the Drama League—stricken in the death of its founder and president—adopt this minute of their sorrow.

Mrs. Edmund Burke, with her strong sympathy for the finer things of life, strove to cleanse and broaden worthy drama in all forms, and with that purpose founded by her own efforts this branch of the Drama League.

To it she gave unsparringly of herself, and to her unselfish efforts the drama lovers of this community are indebted for a larger and more discriminating enjoyment of the theater, and for a more inspiring and closer acquaintance with and appreciation of the notable plays of today.

On the personal side, Mrs. Burke possessed in rare measure, tact, dignity, and graciousness. Her outlook on life was broad. Her presence called forth the best in her fellow men and women.

We express our sense of the great loss that has now come to the Drama League, to the whole community, and above all to ourselves individually and desire that this memorial of our sorrow be spread upon the records of the League, published in the newspapers, and a copy sent to the family of our late president, to whom we extend our abiding sympathy.
