ASHLAND AND VICINITY

The next few days promise to be live ones hereabouts politically. Dr. Withycombe will be at the Army, Tuesday, Oct. 13. W. S. U'Ren, independent candidate for governor, Thursday, Oct. 15, 2 p. m., city hall. Governor West, Friday night, Oct. 16. Col. C. K. S. Wood, Thursday evening, Oct. 15, at city hall.

Temperance workers will hold a mass meeting at the Baptist church, Tuesday evening, Oct. 13, to be addressed by R. P. Hutton, of Portland.

School buildings are deserted, the teachers being practically all in attendance at Medford, and they speak highly of the proceedings at the sessions of the inter-county teachers' institute being held there. About the only teacher remaining here is Miss Belah Caldwell, fifth grade of the West Side school, who is detained at home by illness, greatly to her disappointment. A host of friends will be glad to learn of her improvement.

Horace V. Mitchell, well-known rancher and stock buyer, has given up the lease of the John Grubb place east of town and will again become a city resident. He was formerly connected with the city meat markets.

W. R. Payne, of Weston, actively identified with the Eastern Oregon Normal School in that town, was in Ashland, Monday talking over the situation. His contention is in favor of both the Weston and Ashland schools, and is primed with facts and figures regarding the merits of both. Incident to a canvass of the entire state he will visit the teachers' institute now being held at Medford.

Word has been received of the accidental death, Sunday, at Corvallis, Cal., of Mrs. Erma Taylor, due to an auto wreck. Particulars are lacking. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Patrick of this city. Her remains will be brought here for burial, arriving on Wednesday morning. Her husband is Fred L. Taylor, formerly in business here.

L. I. Mullt, national bank examiner, is home on a vacation, and this is the signal for a big hunting party in the direction of the Klamath marshes. The ensemble of the party is now being made up. Enough is already known to confirm the report that the following will certainly enlist in the sporting campaign, to last 19 days or two weeks, the party leaving Tuesday or later: E. V. Carter, L. L. Monday evening he left for the metropolis with five carloads of prime steers, raised in the Klamath section, and which were unloaded and fed here by Ave Good who handles this business at local stockyards.

Janice Purves, pioneer resident of Jackson county, died at his home, 186 Weightman street, this city, Monday, aged 79. He was the father of Miss Nellie Purves, nurse at the sanitarium, and of Mrs. Warren Williams. A son, Roy, lives in San Francisco; Ernest is on the old home ranch in the Wagner creek neighborhood, and two boys, Archie and Louis, remain at home. The wife and mother survives husband and father. Funeral services will be held Wednesday, and interment will be at the Stearns' cemetery in the Wagner creek section. Mr. Purves moved to Ashland from the ranch property about five years ago.

Dr. Smith, democratic candidate for governor, was in town Monday, greeting everybody. He is the personification of geniality and fairly babbles over with an exuberance of optimism. Some of his followers here contend that there is an open challenge for Dr. Withycombe to meet him here in debate at the rally, Tuesday evening, thus making the demonstration a joint affair. Republican committee members disavow this, stating that Tuesday night's event will be a republican rally exclusively, and in accordance with this plan have secured the Army for the gathering.

Simmons, is doing good work in the ministerial line he is also some gardener, especially in the line of squashes for he bought one to Mrs. Hockett last week that weighed forty and a half pounds and has one at home that weighed sixty nine pounds and other garden zenny in comparison.

Last week I made two trips out to the Lewis Bros. farm to try to see two men but failed in both instances as they were both away each time, but I met the Lewis brothers and they were working their corn up into silage. He has tested the silo and says that it has proved to be a grand success, says that he can put more fat on a beef steer in the same length of time with silage than with any other kind of feed, and by the use of the corn in this way he can utilize the whole of it, stock, blade, stuzks, as well as the corn and save the expense of husking the corn.

He said furthermore that by sowing red clover in their orchard that they had cut more hay off of twenty acres this season than they had ever cut off the whole farm altogether any one season before.
