

TEACHERS HEAR SHEPHERD TALK UPON EFFICIENCY

The second day of the joint teachers' institute for Jackson and Josephine counties opened in the high school this morning, with an attendance of over 300. Work in the rural, primary, grammar and principals and superintendent's departments, with an address by Frank H. Shepherd of the O. A. C., on "Education for Efficiency" were the principal features of the morning session. General discussion of legislations and movements for the benefits of the state educational system were discussed.

This afternoon M. S. Pitman, of the Oregon Normal School at Monmouth will deliver an address. One of the features of the institute is the work in behalf of the reestablishment of the state normal school at Ashland. All the attending teachers wear blue badges urging the passage of this measure, and most of the addresses at Monday's and this morning's sessions spoke of the benefits to be derived. Mr. Pitman in his address Monday dwelt strongly upon its needs.

Among the speakers scheduled for the closing day (Wednesday) are J. H. Ackerman, president of the Oregon State Normal at Monmouth, and J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction.

This evening many of the teachers will attend the address at the Natatorium to be delivered by Dr. J. C. Smith, democratic candidate for governor. There will also be an address at the high school by M. S. Pitman and a musical program by the primary pupils of the Medford schools.

PERRITT AND WINGO JUMP TO FEDERALS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 13.—W. D. Perritt, pitcher, and Ivy Wingo, catcher of the St. Louis Nationals, have quit organized baseball, according to an afternoon paper today, and have signed, or will sign with the Federal league. Wingo left here last night for Cincinnati. Before leaving here he refused twice to talk terms for next year's contract with Manager Huggins of the St. Louis Nationals. Perritt also had evaded a meeting with Huggins. It is understood he has signed with the Pittsburgh Federals.

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 13.—Ivy Wingo, catcher, and W. D. Perritt, pitcher of the St. Louis Nationals, have signed up with the Federals and jumped their contracts with the St. Louis National league team, according to Herb Perdue, veteran pitcher, who was traded to St. Louis by Boston this season. Perdue was in Cincinnati with Wingo today. Both were on their way to their homes.

RUSSIANS DROP SEIGE OF PRZEMYSL

THE HAGUE, via London, Oct. 13, 8:20 a. m.—The Austrian legation here has issued the following official communication:

"The rapid advance of the Austro-Hungarian troops along the river San resulted October 11 in the entire withdrawal of the Russian investing force from Przemyśl, Galicia, which was immediately occupied by Austrian relief troops.

"The retreating Russians everywhere were strongly attacked. An attempt on their part to cross the river near Sienawa and Lezajsk gave the Austro-Hungarian troops an opportunity to take a large number of prisoners. These as yet have not been counted."

MRS. OSBORN INSPECTS NURSE TRAINING SCHOOLS

Mrs. O. E. Osborne, president Oregon state board registered nurses, has returned from an inspection tour of the nurse training schools. Progress is reported along many lines, hospitals and nurses homes being built, teaching equipment improved, special teachers of dietetics, massage and social service engaged. Only registered nurses are eligible for hospital positions, Red Cross service, visiting nurse work and social service. A list of accredited schools for nurses may be found in the library.

SULLIVAN PLANS CANAL EXTENSIONS

J. T. Sullivan, general manager of the Rogue River Canal Co., through whose efforts an agreement is being reached with land owners for a 29 year contract for irrigation, expects to leave within a day or two for Portland to arrange for excavation machinery and equipment for constructing extensions to the company's system of canals.

Details still remain to be adjusted preliminary to securing a contract satisfactory to both parties, but it is expected the contract will be perfected within a few days.

MONTENEGRINS WIN VICTORY

LONDON, Oct. 13, 5:43 p. m.—A dispatch from Cetinje, sent by the Rome correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company says Montenegrin troops under General Bukovitch have defeated 16,000 Austrians, supported by six batteries at a point northeast of Sarajevo.

The battle terminated in a hand to hand bayonet conflict which lasted four hours. The Austrians lost 2500 men and the Montenegrins 300. Among the Montenegrins wounded are Generals Medametzka and Gollich. With Medford trade is Medford made.

SEVEN DAYS FOR FRUIT TO CHICAGO FROM MEDFORD

The service this season for green fruit from the Rogue River district to eastern markets via the Southern Pacific company via Roseville, Cal., and Ogden, Utah, has proved the superiority of that route over movement via Portland.

One of the many prominent features in favor of the Ogden route is that the lay-over at Roseville approximates three hours, as compared with about 18 hours' lay-over at Portland.

The running time of 7 days, 13 hours to Chicago, and 10 days, 6 hours to New York, or approximately 8 and 11 days days through service respectively was consistently made and in several cases beaten.

The service via the Ogden route represents practically continuous movement point of origin to eastern market, which is something that the fruit industry has long desired and which the Southern Pacific has given at the first opportunity.

YOUNG PEOPLE MEET FRIDAY

The Southern Oregon Young People's convention will be held in the Presbyterian church in Medford, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, October 16 to 18. Entertainment has been provided for visiting delegates and young people of all Protestant churches in the Rogue River valley and vicinity are expected to be in attendance.

Out-of-town delegates as well as local people are requested to register early during the convention and receive badges and programs.

The opening session of the convention will be a recreation Friday evening and all young people may expect an enjoyable time from what we hear of the committee's plans.

There will be sessions all day Saturday and special services Sunday, including a men's meeting in the afternoon, as well as a women's meeting at the same hour, and a union service of all churches beginning at 7:30, which will close the convention.

Northwest District Field Secretary H. H. Rottman, who is an expert in young people's work, will be on the program each day, and G. Evert Baker, state C. E. president, and Clarence H. Sprague, a noted C. E. worker, both of whom come from Portland, will contribute to the success of the convention.
