

MRS CARMEN ON TRIAL FOR SLAYING OF MRS BAILEY

MINEOLA, N. Y., Oct. 20.—Outlining the state's theory of murder in the case of Mrs. Louise Bailey, shot and killed in the office of Dr. Edwin Carman at Freeport, June 30, Lewis J. Smith, district attorney, opened today for the prosecution, explaining in detail the grounds on which conviction of murder in the first degree of Mrs. Florence Carman would be asked.

"We shall show," said the district attorney, "that the shot that killed Mrs. Bailey was fired by this defendant. We shall show that she passed through the kitchen out through the side yard a moment before the shooting, and that she returned through the kitchen immediately after it. We shall show further that the motive was jealousy and suspicion of her husband."

"To prove this, we shall call a woman whom Mrs. Carman slapped on one occasion when she saw her husband give her money while the pair were in the physician's office. Also we will show that she obtained and installed a telephonic instrument, so that she could spy on her husband, of whom she was intensely jealous."

It is in the long run the most profitable course to pursue. If you can establish your character, you can establish your credit.

More Principle Needed

"What I wanted to suggest to this association in bidding them hearty welcome to the city, is whether we sufficiently apply those same ideas to the body of municipal law which we seek to administer. Citizens seem to play so much larger role now than principle. There was a time when the thoughtful eye of the judge rested on the changes of social circumstances and almost palpably saw the law arise out of human life. Have we got to a time when the only way to change law is by statute? The changing of law by statute seems to me like mending a garment with a patch; whereas law should grow by the life that is in it, not by the life that is outside of it. I should hate to think that the law did not derive its impulse from looking forward rather than from looking backward, or rather that it did not derive its instruction from looking about and seeing what the circumstances of men actually are and what the impulses of justice necessarily are."

Criticizes the Law

"Understand me, gentlemen, I am not venturing in this presence to impeach the law. For the present, by the force of circumstances, I am in part the embodiment of the law, and it would be very awkward to disavow myself. But I do wish to make this intimation, that in this time of world change, in this time when we are going to find out just how, in what particulars and to what extent the real facts of human life and the real moral judgments of mankind prevail, it is worth while looking inside our municipal law and seeing whether the moral judgments of mankind are made square with every one of the judgments of the law itself. For I believe that we are custodians, not of commands, but of a spirit. We are custodians of the spirit of righteousness, of the spirit of equal handed justice, of the spirit of hope which believes in the perfectibility of the law, with the perfectibility of human life itself."

"Public life, like private life, would be a dull and dry matter if it were not for this belief in the essential beauty of the human spirit and the belief that the human spirit could be translated into action and into ordinance. Not entire. You cannot go any faster than you can advance the average moral judgments of the mass, but you can go at least as fast as that, and you can see to it that you don't lag behind the average moral judgments of the mass. I have in my life dealt with all sorts and conditions of men, and I have found that the flame of moral judgment burned as brightly in the man of humble life and limited experience as in the scholar and the man of affairs. And I would like his voice always to be heard, not as a witness, not as speaking in his own case, but as if he were the voice of men in general—courts of justice as well as the voice of lawyers, remembering what the law has been. My hope is that being stirred to the depths by the extraordinary circumstances of the time in which we live we may recover from those depths something of a renewal of that vision of the law with which men may be supposed to have started out in the old days of the oracles, who communed with the intimations of divinity."

FINAL ARGUMENT IN DISSOLUTION OF STEEL CORPORATION

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 20.—Final argument in the government suit to dissolve the United States Steel Corporation, the greatest combination of capital in the world, on the ground that it was created in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, was begun today before four United States circuit court judges, sitting at the United States court, sitting in the district in New Jersey, in which jurisdiction the proceedings were instituted. The case is being heard by Justices Buffington, who is presiding; McPherson, Hunt, formerly of the commerce court, and Woolley, recently appointed to succeed Judge Gray, retired.

It was agreed that the entire week should be devoted to the arguments. J. M. Dickinson, former secretary of war, who has had charge of the government case since the inception opened the argument.

George Wellwood Murray, New York, will argue in behalf of John D. Rockefeller and his son, who along with Andrew Carnegie, George W. Perkins, E. H. Gary, Charles M. Schwab, Henry C. Frick and others, are individual defendants.

F. D. Kellogg of New York will speak briefly for the James J. Hill interests.

The Hill ore interests are involved in the case through the lease by the steel corporation of ore beds in the northwest. Since the institution of the suit this lease has been cancelled and Mr. Kellogg said he did not see the necessity of his appearance, except to touch on certain law points in connection with the lease.

Machine Methods Used

"They held principles and adopted methods directly opposite to our ideas on politics, but we had not yet dreamed they would stoop to outright corruption in forwarding the election of their candidate, or that they held such low estimate on journalistic integrity and responsibility as to imagine that editorial influence was a thing to be bought by the yard, like surgeons' cloth, to be used at will for wrapping ulcerous political sores."

"To us it was a distinct shock to find men high in community esteem employing such methods to thwart a free expression of the people at the polls by stopping the channels of correct political information in the interest of a party machine. Yet, it was the same old method, by the same old machine, to control elections—the same system of corruption employed in the past to delude legislators, barter senatorial elections and dictate unjust laws—in the days when political favors were sold by the neck and votes purchased en bloc for cash in hand."

Editor's Soliloquy

"And we thus soliloquized: Was it because of this corrupt control that the people of Oregon determined to destroy machine power by adopting the initiative, referendum, recall and direct primary, and is it by the same corrupt system that political tricksters now seek to re-establish the powers of government in their own hands? Could these men afford to attempt to elect candidates by corruption unless they felt sure they could control them after election? However that may be, this is certain: they were experienced hands at the business. They bartered our honor without scruple, and essayed surprise that we resented it."

Rape of Oregon System

"Under these circumstances could the Tidings afford to remain silent? Would not silence amount to abetting a rape of the Oregon system and directly contribute to the utter destruction of popular government? Upon this consideration we now speak: No honorable shield can be afforded a system that holds so lightly the integrity of politics and of men, or views editorial expression as a cheap commodity to be bought at a penny the pound. For, in the end corruption honeycombs the foundations of free government and pauperizes the people."

"Corrupt machine domination is the chief menace to popular government. Such manipulation must be discouraged and destroyed. Honor will not permit silence. The Tidings is henceforth aggressively for the Oregon system—that system that so effectively tore control from the grasp of political conspirators and lodged it in the hands of the people. Only those candidates merit support who stand solidly for the people's rule and strict law enforcement."

CARRANZA SENDS FAMILY TO BORDER

EAGLE PASS TEXAS, Oct. 20.—The family of Venustiano Carranza, constitutionalist first chief, reached the Mexican border today. It was announced that they would make their residence temporarily at Piedras Negras, opposite here on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande. The hope was reported to be for the safety of Carranza's family in case of developments unfavorable to him. Piedras Negras was Carranza's provisional capital when his revolution was started. It is in the state of Coahuila, over which he was governor when he raised his revolt against Huerta.

It is said on good authority here that Carranza remarked he might have difficulty in getting his family out of the country but that as for himself, with the family in safety, he could fight his way out.

There was an unconfirmed report here today that Villa had arrested some of the peace delegates at Aguas Calientes.

BERLIN REPORTS HEAVY FIGHTING

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 20, via London, 5:44 p. m.—The following official communication from Berlin, dated October 20, has been received in Amsterdam:

"The Germans advancing along the coast from Ostend met hostile forces at the Yser river, near Nieuport, where fighting has been going on since last Sunday."

"Yesterday the attacks of the enemy west of Lille were repulsed, the enemy suffering heavy losses."

"In the eastern theater of the war there has been no material change."

His pronouncements are like sound—brass and tinkling cymbal—an uncertain tone of a weak man in the hands of a corrupt and powerful machine that cuts out candidates and principles to order—to meet the exigencies of popular consumption—from antedated, reactionary patterns."

Supports Smith

"Regardless of party predilection, the Tidings will advocate the election of Dr. Smith because he stands boldly for the Oregon system, for strict law enforcement, and does not hesitate to announce his principles without innuendo or evasion. His moral back is strong. It is built of good bone and muscle and he does not supinely respond to the beck and call of a political machine that counts corruption the cap sheet of political sagacity and wise manipulation."

From the heights of Dejanina the Austrians bombarded Topzider and the banks of the Save and the Danube, and also sought to cannonade the vicinity of Semlin, but were forced to retire before the Serbian fire."

RESTORE RAILROAD LINES TO ANTWERP

LONDON, Oct. 20, 7:40 a. m.—Railway communication between Antwerp and Brussels and from Bergen-Zoon to Antwerp has been restored, says an Amsterdam dispatch to Reuters Telegram company. Nine thousand refugees have returned from Rosendaal to Antwerp yesterday.

LESSONS OF WAR POINTED OUT BY EX-PRESIDENT TAFT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—The United States should draw from the European war a lesson regarding its own conduct, said Ex-President William H. Taft, in an address here today before the American Bar Association. In discussion the charges of violation of treaties by European nations, Mr. Taft said that this country should put itself in such a position that it could fulfill to the letter the obligations imposed by treaties, and he recommended legislation to that end.

In his address, delivered as president of the American Bar Association, Mr. Taft also said that the progressive party was departing from "the preposterous nostrum" of the recall of judicial decisions because it apparently had become a burden to the party.

In speaking of the European war, Mr. Taft said that President Wilson should have the warmest approval and sincerest co-operation in his efforts to maintain the strict neutrality of this country.

"We are the principal nation," he continued, "and I might say almost the only nation, of the Christian world not so related to the struggle that both sides may really regard us as disinterested friends. It is our highest duty, and the president makes plain his appreciation of this, not to sacrifice and destroy this great leverage for successful mediation, when the opportunity arises, by ill advised and premature judgments."
