SURVIVORS TELL HOW SHIP SUNK

LONDON, Oct. 21.—Captain Johnston and sixteen men of the erew of the British schooner Glitra of Leith, sunk by a German submarine, have arrived in Slavanager, Norway, from Skudesnes, according to a dispatch to the Reafer's Telegram company from that place. In telling of his experience, Captain Johnston said:

"The Glitra left Grangemouth, Scotland, Sunday noon with coal and coke for Slavanger. At half past twelve Tuesday afternoon the German submarine N-17 popped out of the water to the starboard and stopped us about nine miles southwest of Skudesnes, No other craft was in
