

# NAT GOODWIN IN "NEVER SAY DIE" AT PAGE MONDAY

Nat C. Goodwin, who comes to the Page theater on October 26 for one night only, will appear for the nonce in "Never Say Die," a farcical comedy in three acts by William H. Post.

This successful comedy has proven to both Mr. Goodwin and its author to be the epitome and climax of fine light entertainment, as it is now expressed and demanded of the American stage.

Humor that is wholesome, clean, irresistible, fun that is definitely gracious, nicely intermingled with all the tenderness and poignant meaning that comes so natural in the art of acting, as depicted by Mr. Goodwin.

Ascoterie of distinguished players have always been a part and parcel of Mr. Goodwin's previous engagements, and, on this occasion the exotic splendor of Miss Margaret Moreland, everywhere hailed as one of the latest beauties to grace the stage, will be eagerly anticipated, as she occupies the position of leading lady; the critics everywhere have been equally lavish in praising her talents as an actress; Gladys Wilson, Charlotte Lambert, Stanley Harrison, Dennis Cleugh, Isador Marcel, Walter Claxton, Luke Vrohman and Frank Lynch, will handle the remaining parts, and that the scenic investiture will be correct is a foregone conclusion.

# GERMANS IN ANTWERP WARNED FROM LOOTING

THE HAGUE, via London, Oct. 24, 10:10 a. m.—Major General von Bodenhausen, military commander of Antwerp, has issued a proclamation countersigned by Burgomaster Devos of Antwerp, warning the German troops that they are not permitted to commandeer anything whatsoever and that this privilege is only allowed to officers in accord with the necessities of military occupation.

Anything the soldiers need they must buy, the general's proclamation recites, and he strictly forbids them to break into shops. Antwerp, he says, was only surrendered on the understanding that the troops would not misuse their power.

# DEFENDER OF LEIGE GERMAN DESERTER?

THE HAGUE, via London, Oct. 24, 10:10 a. m.—Newspaper advices from Halle, Germany, say the German authorities have opened an inquiry to discover whether General Leman, the defender of Liege, who is a prisoner at Magdeburg, can be identified as Heinrich Lehmann, a soldier of the German army, who deserted during the war of 1870. There appears to be an extraordinary likeness, the advices say, between the men.

# BRAND NEW PAPER MONEY REPLACES GOLD

Gold is scarce, as it always is, but more so than usual in Medford today. Banks this morning gave to business men paper money for the week end business, including some fresh, crisp notes signed by W. H. Gore and John S. Orth of the Medford National Bank. Most of the transactions today are being negotiated with paper money. The shortage of gold is attributed to the heavy shipments of gold to Europe just before the war broke out.

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# STANDPATTERS PLAN WELCOME FOR R. A. BOOTH

The republican party of Jackson county is being repainted, refurbished, and renovated throughout, under the direction of Dr. J. M. Keene, Bert Anderson, Gus Newbury, S. S. Smith, and other stand-pat war horses of the party of Abe Lincoln, whose right wing was crushed by an offensive attack of T. Roosevelt. They are as full of life as a dove fiend with a fresh shot in the elbow, and issue more communications than the French war office. The lieutenants and high privates are all fussed up because R. A. Booth, senatorial aspirant, is due some time next week. More energy has been displayed by the G. O. P. in the last few days, than anyone imagined existed.

A couple of counter attacks were made last week. A report was scattered that the Senator Chamberlain meeting last Wednesday was a "frost." The Portland Oregonian was given a "tip" and sought to confirm the same. It heard there were only 400 people at the meeting. None used these tactics trying to defeat Shadrach for coroner, when politics were young along the Nile.

Another feature of the G. O. P. campaign is the improvement in the eyesight of Booth supporters of the Willamette valley, who visit in this city. They all return home and report that they see a republican victory in Southern Oregon this year. The last week Salem, Roseburg, and Eugene papers have contained articles setting forth that Jackson county will give the entire republican ticket a big majority.

# SERVIANS FORCED TO RETREAT FROM EASTERN BOSNIA

AMSTERDAM, via London, Oct. 24, 3:43 p. m.—A dispatch from Vienna brings the following official announcement by the Austrian government under date of October 23:

"Strong Servian and Montenegrin forces which had penetrated the southeastern frontier districts in East Bosnia, that were without offensive works, were defeated October 22 after a severe battle lasting three days, in the region of Nokro, and forced to retreat hastily. Details will follow later as the results of the pursuit are not yet known."

The report of the battle was signed by Ordnance Master Potiorek.

# DARING SOLDIERS STEAL GUNS FROM AFRICAN REBEL

CAPE TOWN, via London, Oct. 24, 7:50 a. m.—The correspondent of the Cape Times at Carnarvon, Cape Colony, describing the recent revolt of Lieutenant Colonel Solomon Gerhardus Maritz says:

"When Maritz came to Kakamas, in the Cape province, as commandant of the defense force, he took away all the rifles of the local garrison on the plea that he needed them to arm a force against the Germans. Maritz went away and was returning with 700 Germans and traitors when the garrison luckily heard of his approach."

Thirty-eight daring men went to his camp in the night and took rifles, ammunition and horses. Maritz caught up with them 30 miles away. There was a three hours' fight, then the men from the garrison took to the bush where they played hide and seek for several days before they escaped with the loss of only one man."
