# RESCIND CONFIRMATION OF BELGIAN MINISTER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—It was disclosed today that the senate in executive session here just before adjournment of congress Saturday rescinded its action confirming the transfer of Consul General Harry W. Diederich from Antwerp, Belgium, to Barcelona, Spain, in place of Consul General Carl Bailey Hurst, transferred to Antwerp.

Rescinding of the transfer was said to be based on the fact that the Germans had taken Antwerp since objections were made by Belgium against Mr. Diederich because of his German ancestry.

Arrangements were completed Sunday by Blaine Klum for the appearance in this city next Monday, November 2, of the All-Star teams of the American and National Leagues, under the direction of Connie Mack, manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, and C. C. Bancroft, president of the Cincinnati club. Everything has been arranged for but the neutrality of the weather man. Medford will be the only city in the state outside of Portland in which the teams will play, and fans from all over southern Oregon will be on hand to see the contest. Ticket allotments have been made for the fans of every town.

The coming of the All Star team is a sporting event overshadowed only by the visit last November of the world touring Giants and White Sox. Eight of the players selected by Grantland Rice of Collier's as members of the All Star baseball team are included in the list.

The personnel of the teams include Connie Mack, the most interesting figure in baseball, "Seattle Bill" James of the Boston Nationals, hero of the last world series, Jeff Tesereau of the New York Giants, "Bullet Joe" Bush, whose wild heave cost Philadelphia its last chance for the 1914 honors, Grover Alexander, called the best pitcher in the National League, Pitchers Vaughn and Cheney of the Chicago Cubs, Roger Bresnahan the highest paid catcher in baseball, and a half dozen other players whose names are familiar to the fans of the land.
