CASEY ACQUITTED IN CIRCUIT COURT

SEIZED STEAMER FORMALLY RELEASED

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 27.—The Standard Oil steamer Brindilla, flying the American flag, whose seizure by the British cruiser Caronia was made the occasion of a protest by the United States to Great Britain, and a demand for the steamer's immediate release, was formally released today by the Canadian authorities.

SWISS INCOME TAX FOR WAR EXPENSES

BERNE, Switzerland, Oct. 27.—The Swiss government is preparing an income tax bill for presentation to parliament to meet war expenses. The government has spent \$10,000,000 upon the mobilization and maintenance of Swiss troops, guarding neutrality. Much discussion has been going on in the country as to whether it is necessary to continue keeping on the German-French frontiers 30,000 troops in view of there having been no attempt to violate neutrality on the part of either of the belligerents. The decision of the administration has been that it would not be safe to disarm at the present time.

FRANK VAN DYKE BREAKS LEG AGAIN

Frank Van Dyke, who with his mother, Mrs. B. F. Van Dyke, of Phoenix, sustained injuries on a grade crossing accident near Vorheis a month ago, receiving a broken leg at the time, sustained a re-break of his leg, by falling out of bed this morning at his home.

The accident will necessitate the re-setting of his leg. The injured mother and son were removed from the hospital last week. The mother is improving rapidly.

REGISTRATION TOTALS 11,266

The total registration for Jackson county for the November election is 11,266. Of this amount, 7500 are estimated by the county clerk's office to be men, the remainder being women. Two years ago the registration was 6500, the women not voting at that time. The registration for the primary last spring was 8700, an increase of 3500.

The county clerk's office expects to complete the classification of the registration as to sex and politics by the middle of the week, when the work of sending out the election supplies, naming of election officers, etc., and arranging other details will be commenced.

HILL DEMANDING MEXICANS SURRENDER

NACO, Ariz., Oct. 27.—General Benjamin Hill, commanding the Carranza garrison at Naco, Sonora, made a formal demand today on Colonel Hatfield of the American border patrol to return Jose Islas, a captain of the garrison, who killed a fellow officer and a Mexican private last night. The shooting occurred on the border and Colonel Hatfield's report to headquarters states that Islas fired on American soldiers before he surrendered.

Hill's demand for the return of Islas was referred to General Bliss.

ANTWERP FIRMS SEEK BIG DAMAGES

BERLIN, Oct. 27.—According to reports received here from Antwerp, 50 firms of that city will present to the British government claims for compensation for the destruction of goods after the vacation of that city was determined upon. These claims amount to 230 million francs (\$46,000,000) and will be presented through Brand Whitlock, the American minister to Belgium.

CHINA AFFECTED IN FINANCE BY WAR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—China is feeling the effects of the derangement of world finances and has sent a commission to Washington to study the money market here, with a view to recommending measures for the improvement of conditions in China. The commissioners are Wang Ching Fang and Tsai Shu Tung, and as they have been given a roving commission by President Yuan Shi Kai, it is presumed they will extend their investigations to other countries.

GREEKS BEGIN ALBANIAN INVASION

LONDON, Oct. 27, 1:30 p. m.—The Greek diplomatic representatives at the capitals of the great powers have given official notice of the decision of the Hellenic government to reoccupy Epirus, from which the Greek army was withdrawn in March in pursuance of the decision reached at the ambassadors' conference fixing the status of that country.

Greece claims this decision is based upon the necessity of re-establishing order and security in a country adjacent to her territory, now riddled with anarchy, but at the same time she declares that this reoccupation is a purely provisional measure and that she has no intention of intervening in the Avlona district.

MEXICAN SITUATION SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—The situation around Naco, Sonora, where further clashes between the Carranza and Villa forces have been expected, is somewhat improved, according to a report to the war department today from Brigadier General Bliss, commanding the American border forces. General Bliss says Governor Maytorena, with about 1000 Mexicans, is at Villaverde. A band of 1500 Yaquis is said to have gone to San Pedro, fifteen miles away. Many Yaquis still are at a point within two miles of Naco.

NO INTERFERENCE BELGIAN SHIPMENTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Ambassador Page and the Spanish minister in London have been assured by the German military commander in Belgium that there will be no German interference with foodstuffs and supplies sent for the relief of the war-stricken inhabitants.

Ambassador Page said all supplies should be sent in care of either the American or Spanish diplomatic officers in London. He said money would be useless and emphasized that actual foodstuffs should be sent.

CLOSE CHANNELS TO REACH LONDON

LONDON, Oct. 27, 5:05 p. m.—To frustrate the attempts of hostile vessels to reach London, further channels in the Thames, several of which previously had been closed, were closed today by order of the British admiralty till further notice.

Within certain limits, vessels at anchor in the river must not show lights between 7 p. m. and 6 a. m.

FORGER STINGS MERCHANTS WITH BOGUS CHECKS

A young man signing checks as "J. C. Stinger," but whose real name is thought to be J. C. Devereaux, called upon a number of Medford merchants Saturday night, and "stung" them for amounts ranging from \$12 to \$20. He also lived up to his alias in Ashland. This is the first time Medford merchants have fallen for the bad check artist for all of four months. Devereaux alias "Stinger" alias "Fordyce" alias "Stranger" alias "Dean" and many others, was arrested Monday night by the police, and now lies in the city jail.

The first to be stung by "Stinger" was the Model Clothing company, where he passed worthless paper for the sum of \$20. He then walked into Daniels for Duds and did the same thing for the same amount. This morning Chief Pat Mego was on the trail of a couple of bad checks for \$12 each believed to be the handiwork of the same man.

The forger was discovered Monday bright and early. In the afternoon, Ben Plymale of the Model Clothing company saw Devereaux buying tickets for the Page Theater, and last night waited in the lobby for his return. Devereaux became suspicious, and failed to show up. Later he was found by the police.

Devereaux is believed to have passed a half dozen bad checks in Ashland Saturday afternoon, and the police think more will show up in this city.

The arrested man is about 28 years old, well dressed, neat, and apparently of refinement and good education, traits that threw the merchants off their guard.
