BATTLE ALONG YSER LULLS; GERMANS PLUN INLAND RAID

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The battle of the Yser and the series of fights which has taken place along the whole front in Belgium and France appear with the troops now exhausted to have degenerated into numerous isolated attacks and counter attacks in which the gains and losses are about equally divided between the combatants.

On that part of the battle front nearest the sea, where the Germans have delivered repeated attacks with daily increased forces, in their effort to make their way to Dunkirk and eventually to Calais and where the allies have offered such stubborn resistance, there has been another day of comparative calm, and although the Germans in their morning bulletin claim to have made some progress to the south of Nieuport, the French in their communication this afternoon, say there is no campaign.
