

LATEST ADVANCE AGAINST ALLIES BEGINS TO FAIL

PARIS, Nov. 3, 6:55 a. m.—Confidence is growing here that the latest offensive movement of the Germans in Belgium, whereby they hope to gain a clear route to the French channel ports, will fail. All reports here are that the allies have successfully withstood repeated and violent attacks.

HEAVY BALLOTING IN SOLID SOUTH

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 3.—Early indications were that the balloting today in the "solid south" might be heavier than usual, in other than presidential elections, owing to the efforts of the democrats to get out a full vote.

TRIPOLI SAFE FROM TURKISH INVASION

BERLIN, Nov. 3.—Turkey, according to an official announcement made in Berlin today, has pledged her word not to attempt an Islamic movement in Libya and therefore there is no cause for Italian uneasiness regarding Tripoli.

VICTORY AT YPRES MOST COSTLY IN EMPIRE'S LIFE

LONDON, Nov. 3, 3:20 a. m.—Telegraphing from Calais under date of Sunday, the correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "The British army has endured an historic ordeal in checking the German attempt to advance on Calais. The German offensive has crumbled into stalemated, but the empire should know that the victory at Ypres has been purchased at a price as high as any previously recorded in British battle history."

SERBS ARE DRIVEN ACROSS RIVER DRINA

LONDON, Nov. 3, 11:20 p. m.—The following dispatch has been received from Berlin by the Marconi Wireless company: "It is officially reported from Vienna that our troops maintained their successes of previous days when, in their advance upon Mueva they encountered strong positions protected by barbed wire entanglements which they succeeded in breaking through near Raynje after two days heavy fighting."

EAST INDIANS NOT IN SYMPATHY WITH TURKEY

BOMBAY, Nov. 3, 7:45 a. m.—The Bombay Chronicle, in an editorial headed "Suiende," says of Turkey's entrance into the European war: "The folly and rashness of those in whose hands the destiny of Turkey is placed, have plunged her in a vortex from which she cannot emerge with any shred of a status as a nation."

HEAVY FIGHTING ALONG YSER RIVER

LONDON, Nov. 3, 8:43 a. m.—"Heavy fighting is reported today along the Yser, apparently to cover the movements of large bodies of troops in a southerly direction," says a Rotterdam dispatch to the Times. "The Germans, with ammunition wagons and guns, marched from Bruges to Courtrai today," the correspondent continues, "and there is pronounced activity among the British armies. It is stated three German staff officers were killed by a bomb dropped at Thielt, fifteen miles southeast of Bruges."

Clara O. Abbott Clara Orena Abbott died at Cannonville, Ore., Oct. 20, at 10:30 p. m., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Abbott of Jacksonville, Ore. She was born near Salem, Ore., Feb. 9th, 1892. At the time of her death she was 21 years, 8 months, 21 days of age. Miss Abbott was employed as a teacher in the Drew school and taught two days when she suffered with an attack of acute jaundice, after four weeks of suffering symptoms of typhoid was noticed and two days after death relieved her.

MANY WOMEN BATTLE IN RUSSIAN RANKS

LONDON, Nov. 3, 3:11 a. m.—The correspondent of the Morning Post in Petrograd, sends the following: "Rumors persist that Przemysl, in Galicia, has been taken, but these reports are untrue. What really happened is that the Russians captured 1000 of the garrison, with a large amount of arms and equipment, when the garrison attempted a sortie. Cholera and typhus are reported to be raging at Przemysl."

HOIST TURKISH FLAG ON RUSSIAN STEAMER

LONDON, Nov. 3, 8:20 p. m.—According to a Constantinople telegram reaching here by way of Berlin," says Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent, "the Russian steamer Korallevo-Olga was seized at Constantinople last night. A Turkish crew was put aboard the vessel and the Turkish flag hoisted."

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASES ATTACK CHICAGO CATTLE

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Foot and mouth disease was admitted today to have broken out in the Union Stockyards here. All of the federal government inspectors at the yards have expressed that opinion. "While no doubt exists that the disease has attacked a cow at the yards, formal announcement of the fact will be withheld until tomorrow pending scientific proof from a calf which has been inoculated with virus from the cow's mouth."

LEVELAND, O., Nov. 3.—The Cleveland stockyards were placed under federal quarantine today, the order being part of the plan inaugurated in other cities yesterday to prevent spread of foot and mouth disease.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—A corps of 197 government inspectors traveling in Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Pennsylvania reported today they had found no new outbreaks of the foot and mouth disease among cattle in districts outside those already infected.

BOURNE WINS MINE SUIT WITH MILLIONS AT STAKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—In affirming today a decision of the district court of Idaho in favor of former United States Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., of Oregon and of the Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mining and Concentrating company in their suits against the Stewart Mining company, the United States circuit court of appeals settled a controversy in which several millions of dollars were at stake. Suits were brought by the Bourne company to prevent the Stewart concern, which operates an adjoining claim, from working underneath the other.
