

## NO FEAR OF RAID FROM GERMANS FELT IN CANADA

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 4.—No apprehension is felt here of a raid on Victoria and Vancouver by the German warships which apparently scored a victory over the British squadron in the south Pacific on Sunday. Besides the Japanese cruiser Idzumo, the British cruisers Newcastle and Swiftsure, as well as the Canadian cruiser Rainbow are attached to the Esquimaux station. There are at least two Japanese cruisers off Honolulu and the great Japanese battleship Kongo, which has a battery of 14 inch guns aboard is reported to be between the Golden Gate and Honolulu. It is also pointed out that several more British cruisers now operating around Kiau Chow could get to this coast as soon as the Germans could get to Cape Flattery. There is little chance of the Australian fleet coming this way, because it would be needed to protect its own coast. The strait of Fuca in the vicinity of Victoria has also been mined, it is announced, and it is declared for this reason alone to be impossible for any foreign gunboats to get into the gulf of Georgia between Vancouver Island and the main land.

LONDON, Nov. 4, 4:40 p. m.—"The sound of cannon has been distinctly heard at Ghent," telegraphs the Amsterdam correspondent of the Central News, "and there is every indication that the Germans are retiring on the whole front from Bruges to Thilift, fifteen miles southeast of Bruges."

## WHEAT DEVELOPES DECIDED WEAKNESS

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Wheat developed weakness today, influenced by a decided increase of the European visible supply. The opening, which was 1/2 cent lower to 1/4 up, was followed by a decline all around and then an upturn to Monday night's level. Active inquiry from exporters put strength into corn. After starting a shade off to a shade up, prices made a moderate general advance. Oats followed corn upgrade, trading though was light. Firmness was the rule in provisions. Lower prices for hogs were ignored.

## SPIRITED BATTLE STILL RAGING ON BANKS OF YSER

PARIS, Nov. 4, 3 p. m.—The French war office gave out an official announcement as follows: "On one left wing to the north the situation shows no change as compared to yesterday. The enemy has drawn back on the right bank of the Yser. We have recaptured Lombaertzyde. The Germans occupy on the left bank of the Yser nothing more than the head of a bridge, half way between Dixmude and Niepoort. They have abandoned, in addition to prisoners and wounded men, a considerable quantity of war material, including artillery. "Between Dixmude and the Lys the fighting has continued with alternate advances and withdrawals, but with the general result that the allied forces have made perceptible progress. "Between the Lys and the region of Arras there has been cannonading and minor engagements. "Between the region of Arras and the Oise we have made an advance to the east of Lequesnoy-en-Santerre. "On the center the German attack, which developed on the right bank of the Aisne, in the region of Vailley, and which resulted in our losing the first slopes to the north of Vailley and to the north of Craonne, was not continued yesterday. A counter attack by our forces brought again into our possession a portion of the lost ground. "A violent cannonading and spirited German attacks were repulsed on the heights of the Highway des Dames and in the vicinity of Rheims. There has been no happenings of importance between Rheims and the Meuse, nor in the Woivre districts. "On our right wing in Lorraine there is nothing new to report. "Russia: In East Prussia the Germans are taking up the defensive and the Russians at certain points on the front are making successful progress. In Poland the Russian troops have occupied Szadez, Lask and Rosproza without serious resistance. To the west of Kielce, the Germans are retiring on Wloszczoowa and Andreyeff. The Austrians, driven back to the southeast of Kielce, are holding only to the north of Sandomir. On the lower San river there have been engagements at Rosewadoff and Nisko, the results of which were favorable to the Russians, and the Russians continue to cross this river. The German general staff has been moved to Czenstochowa, near the frontier of Silesia."

## MONMOUTH LOST WITH CREW IN FIRST NAVAL FIGHT

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 4.—The victory of the German fleet, under Admiral Von Spee, consisting of the armored cruisers Scharnhorst and Gneisenau and the light cruisers Nürnberg, Leiseric and Bremen over the British squadron, made up of the cruisers Monmouth, Good Hope and Glasgow, and the transport Otranto, commanded by Rear Admiral Cradock, continues the sensation of the hour here.

That the Germans were able to sink or scatter the British squadron with only minor damage to their own ships and a casualty list of only two wounded is a subject of wonder. "The Monmouth is known to have been lost with practically all of her crew, as a result of this, the first big naval fight of the war. The Good Hope was severely damaged and on fire when she escaped under cover of darkness, and it is believed here that she went to the bottom, while the Glasgow and the Otranto took refuge in a Chilean port. "The Scharnhorst, Gneisenau and Nürnberg still were in the harbor early today, coaling and provisioning, in preparation for steaming away later in the day.

## PERSIAN ULTIMATUM SENT TO RUSSIA

BERLIN, Nov. 4, by wireless.—A dispatch received here from Copenhagen, according to information given out in Berlin officially today, says that the Persian minister to Petrograd has demanded the immediate recall of the Russian forces of occupation in Persia.

Russia for some time past has maintained permanent garrison in the northern portion of Persia.

## RUSSIAN TROOPS CROSS FRONTIER IN TURKISH INVASION

PETROGRAD, Nov. 4.—An official communication from the staff of the Russian army in the Caucasus, given out here today, says that Russian troops have crossed the Turkish frontier, driving back the enemy's advance guards and taking a number of towns.

The text of the communication follows: "Our troops have crossed the frontier of Turkey and having driven back the Turkish advance guards, they took possession, after engagements of the towns of Zivine, Karakillise, Passinka, Akhty, Bontakh, Khorouin, Mysoun and Arzap. "The Turkish forces retreated after having suffered losses and abandoned their dead."

## GERMAN COLUMNS WEND EASTWARD

HAVRE, Nov. 4.—"An almost unbroken column of the enemy, composed of all arms and extending from Leke to Thourout, has marched in an easterly direction. No forces of the enemy of any importance are recorded east of the Yser, but several supply trains have proceeded from Thourout in the direction of Roulers and Deynze, on the Lys."

## MEXICAN CAPITAL MOVED TO PUEBLO

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 4.—The constitutional provisional government, with cabinet members and archives, was moved today to Puebla, where General Carranza has been for several days, said an official report received today from Mexico City. The cause of the change of the government seat was not given.

## ALLIES ADVANCE TOWARD DUNKIRK

HAVRE, Nov. 4, via Paris, 4:10 p. m.—The Belgian minister of war today made public an official report received by him from Furnes on the Belgian coast half way between Dunkirk and Ostend; the text of which is as follows: "Detachments of allied troops, which today pushed ahead as far as Lombaertzyde, on the Yser front below Schoorbakke, failed to discover any of the enemy.
