WORDEN FACES SECOND RECALL ELECTION, KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Nov. 10.—Now that the general election is ended, there are rumors that Klamath county may have a recall election before long, and it will be the second time that County Judge Will S. Worden has been the target in the past year and a half. Worden was a candidate for re-election last Tuesday, and he was opposed by Marion Hanks, a local hardware merchant, who ran on the democratic ticket. In this contest, party lines were thrown entirely aside, and the campaign was one of the most bitter in the county's history.

A few days before election came the announcement of the supreme court that all county judges elected in 1910 should hold office until 1915. Instead of ending the fight in Klamath, this made it even more spirited, and both factions worked harder than ever for an expression by the people at the polls.

The count of the ballots showed that Hanks polled 234 more votes than Worden. Worden's opponents state that this is conclusive evidence that the people are tired of the Worden administration, and they say that Worden should resign. But from the Worden camp comes no intimation of an intended resignation. Instead, Worden will hold the office, they say, to carry through his plans. In case this is done, an effort to recall him is expected.

All eyes are at present on County Clerk De Lap. If he issues a certificate of election to Hanks, the latter can take charge of the office, and Worden, to fight for the place, will be compelled to bring quo warranto proceedings. In case De Lap does not issue the certificate of election, Hanks will in all probability start a mandamus action to compel this, so the matter is bound to get into the courts if it does not result in a recall election.
