SALEM, Or., Nov. 13.—In an opinion rendered yesterday afternoon Attorney General Crawford held that, although the state fish and game commission is authorized under statute to declare the open season for game and fish closed when it deems it for the best, it cannot extend it. The commission, he held, can exercise only such powers as are conferred upon it by statute, and it not being clothed with the power of extending the open season, it cannot exercise such power.
