

KAISER OFFERS TO SELL MARBLE PALACE VILLA OF ARCHILLEION

GENEVA, via aris, Nov. 12, 11:59 p. m.—Emperor William is offering his marble palace, the Villa of Achilleion, in Corfu, for sale. It was built in 1890-91 for the Empress Elizabeth of Austria at a cost of \$5,000,000 and has since been improved. A syndicate of Germans and Swiss hotel men wished to buy Achilleion a few years ago, but they were outbid by the Emperor.

The Emperor's decision to sell the place, it is stated, is the result of the uncertain attitude of Greece towards Germany and Austria. It is said he fears confiscation of the palace if Greece joins the allies. A Swiss syndicate has been given an option on the place at a low price.

The Villa of Achilleion, which is in the Italian renaissance style, was purchased in 1907 by the German Emperor. The gardens are open to visitors. At the back of the villa are peristyle and three terraces with a large number of statues and among them, on the outermost terrace, is a dying Achilles by Herter.

The large park, descending toward the sea in terraces, contains a small temple with a seated marble statue of Heine, the poet, by the Danish sculptor Hasselriis. The villa was erected by the Italian architect Raffaele Carito.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC BUYS EUREKA LINE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—Financial circles here were stirred today over an announcement that two of the biggest railroad deals ever consummated in California were about to be put through. The deals affect the Southern Pacific, Northwestern Pacific, Santa Fe and Northern Electric railroads and will be completed, according to reports, as soon as the appraisers and auditing departments of the San Fe and Southern Pacific finish their reports.

The Santa Fe, according to an announcement, is to sell its half interest in the Northwestern Pacific, running from San Francisco to Eureka, to the Southern Pacific, which already owns half of its stock.

The Northern Electric is to become Santa Fe property and the Santa Fe plans practical reconstruction of the Northern Electric for use as a steam road as well as an electric line.

By acquiring control of the Northern Electric, the Santa Fe will get what it has long wanted—a collection of feeder roads in the Sacramento valley. There will be built at once, it was said, a direct line from Sacramento to San Francisco, via Vallejo, a favorite project with the owners of the Northern Electric before it went into the hands of Receiver J. B. Coghlan.

CONTEST JUDGESHIP OF DEL NORTE COUNTY

Attorney G. A. Webb and R. W. Miller, of Crescent City, Cal., passed through Medford Thursday en route to San Francisco. Mr. Miller is the candidate for superior judge of Del Norte who was defeated in the late election by Judge J. L. Childs. In the primary election Miller won out over Childs by 14 votes, but at the general election Childs' name was written in on the ballot to give him the election by a margin of 46 votes. Miller claims that Childs was not eligible to become a candidate after being defeated at the primary. He also maintains that votes cast for "Childs," "J. L. Childs," and for "John L. Childs," should not have been counted as for one person, and he will take action to obtain the office for himself. A number of libel suits are also threatened.

HOMESTEADERS MAY CUT NEARBY TIMBER

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 13.—The commissioner of the general land office has made a ruling that all homestead settlers may annually take from nearby land, timber valued not more than \$50 on the stump. This is to relieve homesteaders and aid them in building sheds, barns, houses or fences.

SERVIAN RETREAT ALONG ENTIRE LINE CLAIMED BY AUSTRIA

LONDON, Nov. 13, 7:15 a. m.—A dispatch to Reuter's Telegram company from Vienna, via Amsterdam, says:

"An official telegram from the southern war theater states that the attacks on block houses and strongly fortified positions, together with the pursuit of the enemy, continued on the whole front Wednesday. The line east of Nakovani and Novoselo, on the Save river, was reached by the Austrian troops.

"The Servians are in full retreat on Kotzieteva and Valievo, where, according to reports from Austrian aviators, ammunition and provision cars block all the ways of communication.

"Four guns, fourteen ammunition cars and numerous prisoners were captured."

JACKSON COUNTY'S ASSESSMENT RATIO 71

SALEM, Or., Nov. 13.—The state tax commission has announced the tentative county ratios for 1914, and forwarded copies to the various counties in the state. These ratios represent the relation between the average assessed valuation and the full cash value of property in a county, and are used as a basis of equalization between the counties in the apportionment of the state tax, and also govern in the apportionment to the counties of the assessment imposed by the tax commission on public service corporations. Because summaries had not been received tentative ratios have not been prepared for Baker, Coos, Lake, Tillamook, Umatilla and Wheeler counties. The ratios for the other counties are:

SPAIN PROTESTS BOMBARDMENT OF RHEIMS CONSULATE

MADRID, Nov. 12, via Paris, 4:50 a. m.—The alleged shooting of five Spaniards by German soldiers at Liege and the bombardment of the Spanish consulate at Rheims, were the subjects of a lively debate in the Cortes today.

Deputy Santa Cruz declared that the government did nothing to protect Spanish subjects and said it was especially shameful that General Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, after shooting so many Spaniards, should be permitted to come and live in Spain.

The foreign minister, Eduardo Dato, replied that the German government had promised to investigate the Liege affair.

Deputy Soriano, replying to the foreign minister, said that this was not enough. In his opinion, Germany should be required to pay an indemnity.

TED LAFFERTY'S TALK TO COWS AND CHICKENS

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—"While the cows and chickens are all great friends of ours and we hate to see them imposed upon, we really don't blame you a bit," said a federal jury to Claude Steeprow yesterday afternoon when it refused to send him to prison for dumping a consignment of Congressman A. Walter Lafferty's campaign speeches into a barn rather than deliver the franked Congressional Record pamphlets to the people along his rural route at Asea, Or.

Of course the jury did not express its view in so many words, but it acquitted Steeprow.

Steeprow was tried once before. A hung jury resulted. Being voters, the jurymen all received franked pamphlets from Lafferty during the recent campaign. This time they acquitted Steeprow.

5000 GERMANS TAKEN PRISONERS AT TSING TAU

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The East and West News Bureau made public today the following dispatch from Tokio:

"The formal meeting of the commander-in-chief of the Japanese army, Lieutenant General Kuma, and Captain Meyer Waldock, former governor of Tsing Tau, occurred November 10, at the Moltke barracks.

"Captain Waldock will go on board a transport bound for Japan on the 14th. The total number of prisoners taken is 5000. The ceremony of entry by the Japanese troops into the city of Tsing Tau is expected to take place on the 16th."
