BERLIN, Nov. 13, by wireless.—According to information given out to the press today in official quarters, German aviators have flown over the English seaports of Sheerness and Harwick.

Sheerness is a fortified seaport in Kent, at the mouth of the Thames. It is about forty miles from London. Harwick is in Essex and about seventy miles northeast of London.
