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HOP GROWERS OF COAST UNITE

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 18.—Growers of hops, representing growers' associations in Oregon, California and Washington, assembled here today for the purpose of organizing the growers' associations of all three states into the Pacific coast hop-growers' association. They will be in session for several days.

In addition to finding markets for crops of the growers at profitable prices, it is planned to have the new coast association furnish finances for growers who may need them in planting and harvesting their crops. In the past, according to contention of those assembled to organize the association, growers have been victims of speculators, and these have reaped most of the profits of hop crops produced in their states.

KEEP EMBARGO UPON LIVESTOCK

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The federal government will not lift the embargo on shipments of cattle because of the foot and mouth disease in uninfected areas of quarantined states until thoroughly convinced that the disease does not exist in such territory. Secretary Houston's views on the subject were outlined today to a delegation representing the National Livestock Exchange, who urged such action on the ground that cattlemen were hampered because they cannot ship cattle from uninfected areas.

AMERICAN SHOT BY MEXICAN BULLET

NACO, Ariz., Nov. 18.—R. H. Reynolds, a United States customs inspector, was shot through the left leg by a stray Mexican bullet today when the Maytorena forces made a general attack upon the Carranza garrison of Naco, Sonora. Reynolds was in a hotel on the American side at the time. The bone of the limb was shattered.

The artillery fire of the attackers was not well directed and shrapnel burst frequently over the headquarters of the American troops guarding the border. Bullets from Maytorena's Yaqui riflemen also crossed the international line.

TO DISCUSS IRRIGATION

THE immediate future of the valley depends to a very large extent upon the construction of an irrigation system which will place the entire valley under water and so make possible intensive cultivation, which will increase many fold the annual production.

In a comparatively wet season, like that of 1913, the valley's output was several times, in fruit, vegetables and staples, what it has been in the dry season of 1914. This alone tells the story of the need of water. With irrigation, it would be every year many times that of the most favorable seasons without it.

Fruit raising is not a commercial proposition, except upon most suitable soil, without irrigation—not but that fruit can be grown profitably in favorable years, but it is the average that the fruit grower must depend upon, and the average orchard that the valley must figure upon, and the large annual output is impossible without irrigation. That is why a smaller area of planted orchard in the northern districts has so much greater annual output than the Rogue River valley.

Watsonville and the Pajara valley, California, offer an example of the irrigated valley. With far less acreage in fruit, the annual output exceeds 5000 cars, while produce of even greater value is also annually shipped from this relatively small territory through intensive farming.

To make hog raising most profitable, irrigation is needed, and with water to raise the necessary produce, thousands of cars of hogs can be shipped from this valley annually. In fact, intensive farming, save on the most favorably located land, is impossible without irrigation. In every line of production water is an essential.

Whether it will be most advantageous for the valley to form itself into an irrigation district or not is for the people to decide. A mass meeting to discuss the situation has been called for Saturday afternoon at the Medford public library, and every person interested should be present.

It is very generally realized that something definite must be done, and done at once, to remedy the existing situation and place the valley in the productive class it belongs in.

DECREASE IN NUMBER OF RAILROAD COLLISIONS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—A great decrease in the number of collisions and derailments of railroad trains for the quarter ending June 30, 1914, as compared with the preceding quarter, was reported today by the interstate commerce commission. As compared with the corresponding quarter in 1913, there was a decrease of 737 in the number of train accidents. Defective roadway and defective equipment together caused more than 72.3 per cent of all derailments reported.

In train accidents the total number of persons killed was 104, while 2157 were injured.
