NON-UNION MINERS TO RESUME WORK

FORT SMITH, Ark., Nov. 18.—Non-union miners recruited from the Clackville and Jintown camps left today for the Bache Denman properties at Prairie creek, which are to resume operations at once under orders of the federal court.

The non-union men stopped at Midland, about three miles from Camp Garrison, where the federal troops are located. It was stated today that the union miners of this district, through Edward Cunningham, will present their side of the controversy in Hartford valley to President Wilson, secretary of War Garrison and Secretary of Labor Wilson tomorrow.

MURDER MYSTERY STARTLES EAST SIDE

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—A man murdered last night and stuffed into a barrel, carried to a lonely street under the Queensboro bridge and left there, to be found before the warmth had left his body, was identified today. He was Luigi Macaluso, aged 22, a tailor, who lived in that section of Manhattan East Side, best known to the police as the home of gangsters and gunmen. He himself had served a sentence for carrying a pistol, and detectives seeking to unravel the mystery of his death thought it due to a feud between rival gangs.
