

PLANT SHADE TREES ON PACIFIC HIGHWAY

A joint meeting of the boards of directors of the Greater Medford and Commercial clubs was held last night at the library.

Several matters of civic importance were discussed, including the project of securing the planting of shade trees along the new Pacific highway from Central Point to Phoenix and possibly beyond. The state highway engineers have set the stakes for this purpose.

Plans were discussed for organizing an associated charities to systematize charitable activities, insure proper investigation of all instances reported and promptly and well directed relief in deserving cases.

The lack of attention in the park, the street lights, and rubbish piles about the city received earnest consideration and a committee was appointed to interview the councilmen on the matter.

The new charter was mentioned and the fact that there under city officials were definitely responsible for conditions in all branches of the city's administration was favorably commented on.

CLAIM RUSSIANS AIDING SERVIANS

BERLIN, Nov. 19, via London, 1:15 p. m.—The Cologne Gazette publishes a dispatch from Sofia, Bulgaria, saying that several thousand Russian officers and soldiers have appeared in Servia.

Under present conditions, it would be impossible for Russia to send troops to the assistance of the sorely pressed Servians unless she transported them by water from Archangel, in the far north, around almost the whole continent of Europe, or else invaded neutral territory. With the Dardanelles closed to her, her only alternative would be to send troops across Rumania or Bulgaria.
