

AMMONS REQUEST TO DELAY INQUIRY INTO MINES DENIED

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—The suggestion of Governor Ammons of Colorado that the investigation of the United States commission on industrial relations into the coal miners strike be postponed, was declined today.

Frank P. Walsh, chairman of the commission, sent the following telegram to Governor Ammons:

"Your telegram received. It will be impossible to postpone the hearing of the United States commission on industrial relations set for December 1 at Denver. Please be assured that no action will be taken subversive of the maintenance of peace and order, or which is not in full accord with the public welfare. I trust that the commission may have the privilege with co-operating with you to that end."

PARADE IN HONOR OF BRITISH ARMEN

LONDON, Nov. 25.—A dispatch from Geneva, Switzerland to the Express says:

"A telegram from Belfort states that the commanding general had a parade Monday in honor of the British airmen, Commander Dabblington and Flight Lieutenant Rippe, who participated in the raid on Friedrichshafen, and decorated them with the Legion of Honor. Later officers of the garrison entertained the airmen at a banquet.

"It is reported here that two Zeppelins at Friedrichshafen were seriously damaged."

SIBERIANS SHIPPING BUTTER TO LONDON

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—Siberian butter is now being shipped to England through the Panama canal, it was stated among butter dealers here today.

Siberia is one of the world's greatest butter producers and has marketed the product largely in England and Germany. The German market is closed to them and the usual routes to England are also closed. In consequence it is said that the Siberians are shipping their butter overland to Port Arthur, Manchuria, and across the Pacific and through the canal to England.

FOUR BADLY HURT IN PORTLAND FIRE

PORTLAND, Nov. 25.—Four men were injured, two seriously and several other persons had narrow escapes from death here today when the Hotel Navoy was damaged by fire. Iva Jantis and Charles Baker were rescued by firemen after they had been burned so severely that their recovery is doubtful. Carl Jensen and Peter Nelson suffered less serious injuries. The fire is believed to have originated from spontaneous combustion. The damage to the hotel amounted to about \$7000.

ANDREW CARNEGIE SEVENTY NINE TODAY

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Andrew Carnegie is 79 years old today.

"I'm getting younger," he said. "Seventy-nine years isn't so old for a man to live if he takes good care of himself and lives according to the gospel of God. Old age and myself have not become acquainted yet."

RUSSIAN GRAND DUKE DMITRI REPORTED WOUNDED

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 25, via London, 10:45 a. m.—German newspapers have received a telegram from Milan saying that the Russian grand duke, Dmitri, son of Grand Duke Paul Alexandrovitch, uncle of Emperor Nicholas, was severely wounded in an engagement on the River Warta.

FRENCH REPORT TERRITORY GAINED VICINITY OF YPRES

PARIS, Nov. 25, 2:42 p. m.—The official statement given out by the French war office this afternoon says:

"From the north sea to Ypres there has been no infantry attacks. Between Langemarck and Zonnebeke we have gained territory. In the vicinity of La Bassée the Indian troops recaptured from the enemy certain trenches which had been taken from them the evening before. From La Bassée to Soissons there has been almost complete calm.

"We have made slight progress near Berry-au-Bac and in the Argonne.

"At Bethancourt, northwest of Verdun, a German attack has been repulsed. A suspension of hostilities requested by the enemy has been refused.

"In the region of Pont-a-Mousson our artillery found it possible to bombard Arnville.

"Nothing has happened in the Vosges."
