

### BRITISH WARSHIP BULWARK BLOWN UP 800 LOSE LIFE

SHEERNESS, England, via London, Nov. 27, 3:55 p. m.—Thirty bodies from the British battleship Bulwark were recovered from the river Tuhama today. The Bulwark was blown up off Sheerness yesterday, presumably the result of an internal explosion.

Most of the bodies so far recovered are mutilated almost beyond identification. Many pathetic scenes were witnessed as relatives assembled in an effort to obtain information concerning those on the ill-fated warship. Up to the present time, however, the authorities have not given out a list of the lost.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—It was officially announced here Thursday that the British battleship Bulwark had been blown up off Sheerness. Only twelve men out of the 700 or 800 on board the Bulwark were saved.

According to the admiralty the explosion which resulted in the destruction of the Bulwark is believed to have originated in her own magazine.

The announcement of the disaster to the Bulwark was made by Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, shortly before 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The explosion which destroyed the Bulwark occurred at 7:53 a. m. A vice-admiral and a rear-admiral who were at Sheerness reported that they were convinced that the disaster was caused by a magazine explosion.

There was an upheaval of the water. When the smoke had cleared away the ship had entirely disappeared.

An inquiry will be held tomorrow and the Admiralty believes that it may throw some light upon the occurrence.

Mr. Churchill speaking in the house of commons concerning the disaster said: "The loss of the ship does not sensibly affect our military position, but I regret the loss of life, which was very heavy. Only twelve men were saved. All the officers and the rest of the crew, which I suppose amounted to between 700 and 800, perished."

### QUIET DAY SPENT ALONG BATTLE LINE OF EASTERN FRANCE

PARIS, Nov. 27.—The French war office gave out an official statement this afternoon as follows: "The slackening of the artillery fire of the enemy was noted all along the line during the day of November 26. Two infantry attacks directed against the heads of bridges which we had thrown down on the right bank of the Yser to the south of Dixmude were easily repulsed.

"There was no other engagement on the rest of the front in Belgium, and as far as the Oise, nor was there any action on the Aisne or in Champagne. Nevertheless Rheims was rather violently bombarded during the time that a number of journalists from neutral countries were making a visit to the city.

"In the Argonne some infantry attacks resulted in the loss and then the recapture of certain trenches. The men engaged in this fighting never exceeded a battalion. The ground lost and then retaken was never more than twenty-five yards.

Along the heights of the Meuse and in the Vosges there is nothing to report."

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 24.—Russian children will receive their Christmas gifts from America if American children have done their duty. Nelson Morris, the American minister in Stockholm, has taken up with the Russian authorities the question of admitting the gifts and of facilitating their shipment and distribution. His efforts have met with ready response on the part of the Russians and he gives assurance of arrangements for the prompt handling of the part of the Christmas ship's cargo destined for that country.

### O. & C. LAND GRANT CASE RUSHED IN SUPREME COURT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Solicitor General Davis today moved in the supreme court to have sent up for review the entire record in the government's case against the Oregon & California Railroad company involving about 2,300,000 acres of land in Oregon estimated to be worth \$75,000,000.

The land was granted to the railroad by act of congress, but the government has charged that the terms were not carried out and the land forfeited. The case has gone through the district and circuit courts. The motion to certify up the entire record is unusual, but was made in view of the importance of the case and of the belief on the part of the government attorneys that questions certified by the court of the circuit court of appeals will not dispose of the whole case.

money market was in better position now than any money market in the world. The treasury had just floated the largest loan ever raised in the history of the world, and the success of this measure, Mr. Lloyd-George said, he took, as justification of the government's action. He pointed out that before the loan of 350,000,000 pounds sterling, he already had raised 90,000,000 pounds sterling (\$450,000,000) for the same purpose, so that practically he had asked for 440,000,000 pounds sterling (\$2,200,000,000) from the same market.

In spite of the absence of the machinery of the stock exchange, which was a serious detriment, the entire loan has been subscribed. There were nearly 100,000 applicants and the government felt it was its duty to give the first allotments to the small applicants who, with the financial houses, had enabled the government to raise this large sum of money without any of the expedients to which Germany had to resort to raise a smaller loan at a higher rate of interest.

### TREES SHELTER SHARP SHOOTERS OF ALLIED ARMY

PARIS, Nov. 27.—Describing the difficulties encountered by the Germans in the hilly, wooded country of the Argonne, a soldier of a German detachment detailed to rid the forest of French troops that were menacing the left flank of the German army operating in that region writes:

"At the entrance to the Argonne we met a company of light cavalry that had received the same order as we. 'Ydu iray search,' they said, 'as much as you like. Yesterday, without having seen a single man, we lost 60 in dead and wounded.' There are hardly any roads in the forest. It is a nearly impenetrable thicket. From every side we were fired on and nowhere could we see even the evidences of a soldier, they were so well hidden in the branches of trees, in the thickets and trenches. An advance was impossible. But we tried it again after a night's repose, and without being able to reach a single enemy we lost 200 men in two days.

"The men posted in those trees are excellent marksmen, as well as wonderfully agile and clever in concealing themselves. In spite of all our efforts we were unable to dislodge them and finally were forced to abandon the effort to drive them out, put ourselves on the defensive and dig ourselves in to escape their murderous fire."
