RAILROAD WAGE DISPUTE PROBED BY ARBITRATORS

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Subjects varying from the pay of express train engineers to monkey wrenches and grease cups were touched upon at today's session of the arbitration board, probing the wage dispute between the engineers and firemen and the western railroads employing them. Sixty four thousand men are affected, according to a statement given to correct the prevailing impression that only 55,000 men are involved.

M. W. Cadley, an official of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, resumed his testimony today and told of the differences in pay received by freight and passenger engineers, explaining that freight engineers receive a higher rate per mile than do passenger engineers, as their progress is much slower.

Warren S. Stone, grand chief engineer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, dismissing the "surprise test" of engineers which the men want eliminated, stated that there is a law in Kansas against the test.

"But it is disregarded," he added.

W. L. Park of the Illinois Central, a member of the board, speaking of the request that engineers be relieved of the duties of switching and flagging, said the request made no mention of emergencies.

"I will say to that," replied Mr. Stone, "that in my twenty-five years as a railroad man I never knew of an emergency where the crew did not break every rule in the calendar when necessary."

BULLIS LOSES TIPS OF THREE FINGERS

S. S. Bullis, president of the Southern Oregon Traction company and Sterling mine, had the tips of the first three fingers of his right hand clipped off by a buzz saw, at his sawmill on the Sterling property last Friday afternoon. The injury is not serious and occurred when Mr. Bullis was inspecting a newly installed saw, and attempting to operate it. One finger was cut off near the first joint. The tips of the two others were torn off.

COUNCIL CUTS POLICE FORCE ONE PATROLMAN

The police force was cut by one man by day at the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night, and two by night. Chief of Police Hiltson will be both chief and patrolman. In case of emergency he can call upon the fire department, all of whom are special policemen. Ten men will guard the city at night. This will mean the retirement of Officer Carney, doing special duty, and later Officer Cady. The change will put Sergeant Pat Mego and Officer Crawford on continental night service.

The salary of Sergeant Pat Mego, who is ill, was allowed for the month. A bill of Chief of Police Hiltson for \$7 worth of stationery was taken under consideration.

Mrs. T. A. Howell, W. T. York and J. H. Bradford were named a registration board for the city and any special election.

An ordinance was passed authorizing the issuance of \$4250 improvement bonds. The Barnum railroad was ordered to stop all its tracks at Eighth and Oakdale streets, as precaution against accident, wood being piled on both sides of the track obstructing the view.

The water committee took under advisement changes in the city ordinance covering charges for the watering of stock. All sewer assessment charges were delayed pending the decision of the Phillips suit now before the circuit court.
