CARRANZA EXECUTES SPANISH SUBJECTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Two Spanish subjects, Vicente Vidal and Eduardo Esugual, have been executed at Tampico by General Caballero, the Carranza commander. The cause of their execution is not known. Caballero himself disclaiming that he knew why he had been instructed to put them to death, according to a report to the state department today from Thomas Devan, the American vice consul. A third Spanish subject is reported in prison on a charge similar to that which led to the execution of the other two.

The Spanish ambassador, Mr. Riano, visited Secretary Bryan and was told that efforts would be made to save the life of the man in prison and that further inquiries had been made to ascertain what were the grounds on which the others were executed.
