EXTENSIVE WORK ON COAL MINES OF ROXY ANN

Extensive prospecting for coal is being done upon property owned by J. A. Westerlund, on the west and southwest slopes of Roxy Ann, by R. P. Little, who has driven three tunnels at different levels, some of them a considerable distance in, and on a fourth level is sinking a shaft. On all the levels, which are about 125 feet apart, veins of coal superior to that secured from the Sunnyside or Cascade prospects, have been located, and most of the dumps are composed of coal.

Mr. Little is an experienced coal miner and was the locator of the Sunnyside and other prospects years ago. He has traced the coal deposits from Roxy Ann over to the California line and is convinced that one of the greatest coal fields of the west is within sight of Medford. The coal veins or strata vary from six to twelve feet in depth, and the coal so far secured is a high-grade lignite, almost a semi-bituminous. He is convinced that when he is a little farther in, under greater pressure, a much higher grade of coal will be mined.

In some of the tunnels Mr. Little is within a comparatively few feet of where he expects to find the main lode, and future development will be awaited with interest.

RICH ORE FROM BUZZARD MINE

Samples of ore running as high as \$2300 a ton, and some as high as \$4200 a ton from the Buzzard mine on the Umpqua divide near the head of Elk creek are being shown by Mark Applegate, manager and one of the towners. Mr. Applegate has worked developing the mine for the past four years. The ledge is over half a mile in width and has many rich streaks containing gold, silver, zinc, lead and antimony.

The mine has so far paid for its own development by shipping the ore mined to the Selby smelter. The vein from which the samples were taken runs from eight to eighteen inches wide.
