The mayor's annual report shows that city affairs were administered. under the present administration, where Olen Arnspiger is virtually eity manager, for \$18,870.71 less than the year previous-a saving occasfound by the shutting down of improvement work. The report also shows that \$61,000 of improvement bonds, which are not a city indebtedness, were redeemed by property owners in meeting assessments, as against \$67,000 the previous year.
