Probing Licenses

The city council is carefully investigating the matter of licenses, particularly those applying to amusement places. An exhaustive ordinance has been drawn up and passed to a second reading, after its provisions had been submitted to Evan Reames of Medford for approval. The new edict covers a wide range as to classification and character. Physical requirements also are not overlooked as to floor space, etc. As to fees, there will be a sliding scale, depending upon whether the playhouse is of elephantine or lilliputian proportions. Elephants, however, will be barred.

MAYOR'S REPORT SHOWS CITY MANAGED MOST ECONOMICALLY

The mayor's annual report shows that city affairs were administered under the present administration, where Olen Arnsperger is virtually city manager, for \$18,876.71 less than the year previous—a saving occasioned by the shutting down of improvement work. The report also shows that \$61,000 of improvement bonds, which are not a city indebtedness, were redeemed by property owners in meeting assessments, as against \$67,000 the previous year.
